

County Drive for Boys', Girls' Aid Funds Speeds Up

Solicitation of funds needed by the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Oregon is going forward at top speed in Washington county. Mrs. R. W. Well, county campaign chairman, reports, in a state-wide drive, the society is seeking contributions to meet present needs which total \$5,000.

"It is the responsibility of the citizens in our county to help support the dependent children cared for by the Boys' and Girls' Aid society," Mrs. Well stated this week. "Five children from Washington county are receiving aid from the society at the present time and since 1914, care has been provided for 76 boys and girls from our county."

"With the cost of living sharply increased, the Boys' and Girls' Aid must have additional funds or curtailment of service will be necessary. Every contribution counts. A \$10 gift to the society will outfit an infant; \$5 will buy shoes for a child for a year. A \$1 contribution will buy new tooth brushes for 14 children."
