

Contemplated Big Seed Crop Forces Building

Three building permits totaling \$10,000 in new construction were issued at the Hillsboro city hall during the month of June, according to a check-up of City Recorder Ed Bowman.

Largest project of the three is a \$6,000 addition to the Tualatin Valley Co-op warehouse at 100 West Main street. The addition, 100 by 54 feet in area and two stories high, extends from the south end of the present warehouse building to Washington street. Work on the frame structure is already well along.

Need for additional warehouse space is explained by the Tualatin Valley Co-op office as the result of increased pea and vetch seed acreage in the county. The crop last year was so large that storage space was found inadequate and a new storage building was put up by the firm at that time. An even larger crop will be coming in at harvest time this year, it was indicated.

The other two June building permits were for new residences, a \$3,000 home being constructed at 961 East Lincoln by George R. Erickson and a \$1,000 dwelling being erected at 706 South Dennis by W. G. Meyer.
