News Then . . . Remember When?

With apologies to Mr. Ripley: "Believe it or not," this is the Washington county courthouse . . . in 1884. The majestic maple trees which now spread their luxuriant branches around the square had been set out only a year before by Ben Stewart and his brother, Charles, who brought them here from Cooper Mountain. The trees are so small as to be hardly discernible in this picture. It was not until some years later that John R. Porter of near Forest Grove donated the present tall redwoods. The courthouse building as pictured above is the first section of the building, constructed in 1870 by F. H. Elliott, a pioneer of 1852. It housed the circuit courtroom on the second floor and with three additions in future years remained the core of the building which now stands. (Ed. Note: This is the first in a series of five historic pictures showing the courthouse at various points in its history.)
