Motorloggers Pay Visit to Forest Rangers, Men Whose Duty Is to "Keep Oregon Green"

This is one of a series of motorloggers' trips to scenic and recreational areas of the northwest, made through co-operation of the Oregon and the Oregon State Motor Association. The complete series will appear in the Sunday magazine of The Oregonian.

At 35, Charles Mugler (Charley) Reitor is the youngest forest supervisor in the Pacific northwest, the principal forest region of the United States. As head ranger in the expansive 1,068,104 acres of the Wallowa national forest in Oregon's rugged northeastern corner, he is a key figure in the present effort to protect and maintain the natural resources of the state—an effort undertaken at a time when our resources are being mustered for the defense of America.

Not long ago Governor Charles A. Sprague organized a "Keep Oregon Green" committee of representative citizens dedicated to a fight against forest fires. The Oregon Roadside council has launched a crusade for increased safeguarding of the timber along our highways. And the United States forest service, under Lyle F. Watts, regional forester, has redoubled its campaign to prevent fires, wasteful logging and indiscriminate use of the woods.

What are the activities of a typical participant in this long-range program? As a contribution to these conservation endeavors, The Oregonian and the Oregon State Motor association have conducted a motorlog visit to Charley Reitor and his associates in the Wallowa national forest.

A forest supervisor must know what is happening to the forests in his care. Several times a year Charley Reitor saddles horses, loads a pack-train and rides into the Wallowa fastnesses with Grady Miller, veteran ranger who has been in the region for 27 years. With his lean mount, Grady's horse and drawing observations, Grady Miller would satisfy any schoolboy's idea of a ranger.

They Sleep in Wilds

As often as possible, Charley Reitor and Grady Miller sleep in lookout stations and cabins on their pack-train trips. Frequently, however, they penetrate fastnesses where not even the forest service has permanent structures.

In the Pacific northwest, which contains virtually half the standing timber of the nation, there are 129 forest rangers, 20 forest supervisors and 103 staff officers. These men are exclusively charged with the duty of protecting and conserving the region's immense tract of national forests. In addition to them, of course, there are hundreds of lookouts, guards, trail crews and other workers. The rangers—men like Grady Miller—are the backbone of the forest service. They are the men on the line of battle where the conservation fight is really waged.

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Aluminum Drive To Start Monday

metal to which it may be fastened. The scrap aluminum will be cleaned and separated from foreign matter in the smelting process.

Another "don't" emphasized by defense council members is the following: "Don't give away scrap usable pan or utensil with intention of replacing this utensil with a new, shiny one. Only discarded aluminum is sought."

A special drive in rural areas is being organized by William F. Gyrus, county agent with Miss Kathleen McCree, home extension agent, in direct charge. Grange, Farmers' Union, and 4H club leaders will be appointed in the various rural communities. The drive for scrap aluminum in other county cities and towns will be conducted by Boy Scouts, civic clubs, and patriotic groups.

Schedule for collection opens the campaign on Monday, July 21, and designates July 28-29 for the cleanup campaign. On July 30, movement of the scrap material to statewide accumulation centers will be begun by the state highway department.

L. L. MacIntyre, county engineer, has been appointed by the county defense council as chief in charge of transportation in the aluminum drive and will make the necessary plans for transportation of the scrap metals from accumulation centers to a central point where it can be picked up by state highway trucks.
