

City Turns Well Water Into Mains

Increased demands being made on Hillsboro's water supply during the current heat wave are being met with a two-fold plan of action by the city water department, according to City Manager J. W. Barney.

First, the auxiliary supply from a subterranean source was tapped for the first time Tuesday. All pumping machinery at the well, located near the Masonic home, is working in good order and the added water is expected to help materially in meeting the peak demand during hot summer days to come, Barney said.

To Install Pump

Second, a booster pump which will increase pressure and volume of flow in the city's mains is being installed on the south side of West Baseline street near Dennis avenue for operation during peak demand periods.

While the city's water supply from the Sain creek watershed and the newly developed well is believed sufficient to meet the demand here, the 12-inch main bringing water from the reservoir is too small to serve adequately during peak demand times. Manager Barney said. The booster pump is only a temporary answer to the water supply problem, he said, intimating that a larger main supply line into the city will have to be installed in years to come.

Former Resident Writes of China

CORNELIUS—Mrs. W. R. Cooke has received a letter from Miss Winifred Rand, former local girl, now a missionary at Suian Chekiang, China Inland Mission. She writes, "The breadth and length of the city is very small, for one can walk from the west gate to the east gate in 15 minutes time. However, the Chinese live much closer together than we foreigners do, and in this tiny city there are about 10,000 people. The city is located in a small river valley and is surrounded by mountains, which seem almost to come down to meet the river. Dotted here and there along the valley in distance not more than an American mile apart, are tucked away in the mountains are a great many villages. The only way to reach most of these villages is to go by foot along narrow winding paths. We spend two days of each week tramping along these tiny trails with a little band of voluntary Christians carrying the gospel message to these village people. Our church and home is along the main street of the city. The large front door is always open, and many people passing by come in to look at the posters. This is the room where all our services are held. Just before each service, the many pilled benches are taken down and placed. The women and children sit on one side and the men on the far side. We do not have an organ or piano, but you should hear these people sing. There is a group of about 40 Christians, who gather for services four times on Sundays and several times during the week. Besides these services a Sunday school is held early Sunday afternoon, and a service on Tuesday nights for young people. A party of three of us left Shanghai on February 17 via coastal steamer. Six days later we disembarked at a small port where missionary friends met us and helped us through customs. After stopping several days, where we experienced our first two bombardments from the air, we traveled up river by small house boat. The first part of the journey, we were tugged by a motor launch, after which the boat was pulled along by long ropes attached to the boat and held by two men, who walked along the shore. In this boat we spent three days and nights. The next stage of the journey was in a huge truck, which rumbled along a precipitous mountain road. Arriving at the next city we were to go on by train. Here, while waiting on the train platform, with several hundred other people, we suddenly heard the air alarm. Everyone dropped his luggage and ran to the grave covered hills, just outside the city. That day there was no bombing in that city, but planes had passed by enroute to some other places. In all, it took thirty-one days from Shanghai, to reach Suian."

This year there have been very few campers in the city park. Occasionally a car or trailer house will camp for a night. Last year it was a city, with five or six families camping in a night.
