

Four Charged In Grand Jury Indictments

Four men were charged in indictments returned by the Washington county grand jury following a one-day session Monday.

Charges of attempting to take an automobile without permission of the owner were filed against Don Haatja, 46, and Thomas Johnson, 35, transients in the true bill. Harry Floyd, 55, Glenwood, was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and George H. Bell, 43, who gave his true name as George H. Vanderpool, was charged with larceny by bailee.

All four men were arraigned in circuit court Tuesday and given until July 30 by Judge R. Frank Peters to enter pleas. Neal Bush was appointed by the court to defend Floyd. Harold Slade was named as defense counsel for Haatja and Johnson, and Francis Sturgis was appointed to defend Bell.

Michael Waefler Rites Held Here

Funeral services were held in the Helvetia church for Michael Waefler, 80, Hillsboro resident for six years, who died last Wednesday after a prolonged illness. Donelson and Sewell were in charge of arrangements. Interment was in the Helvetia cemetery.

Surviving are one son, Michael, Portland route 6, and two daughters, Mrs. Marie Huey, and Margaret Waefler, Hillsboro. Michael Waefler was born in Switzerland on January 16, 1861, and came to the United States about 20 years ago. His wife, Madeline, died in 1929. Mr. Waefler, a retired carpenter, had been in ill health for 20 years.

Mrs. Estelle Hoover, 68, native and lifelong resident of Hillsboro, died Thursday at her home after a prolonged illness. Funeral services were held Saturday in the Donelson and Sewell chapel with interment in the Hillsboro cemetery.

Fines Handed Out In Justice Court

L. E. Furrow, Hillsboro route 3, drew a fine of \$25 and costs in Justice A. W. Havens court here Tuesday when he pleaded guilty to a charge of burning without a fire permit. Deputy Fire Warden Clay S. Taylor signed the complaint.

Charged with drunken driving, Joseph William Vandecoeve, 25, Forest Grove route 2, drew a fine of \$100 and costs. He was arrested Monday night following a traffic accident near Verboort.

Fines of \$25 and costs each were drawn by two men on separate charges of failure to stop and give name and address at accident scenes. The men were Barney Edward Yocum of Portland, involved in an accident near Widen Hazel, and Don Dean Rossi of Portland, who allegedly failed to stop at the scene of a collision near Gaston.

Longtime Tualatin Resident Passes

Funeral services were held Saturday in the St. Anthony church, Tigard, for Scraphin Klinger, 79, resident of Tualatin for 40 years, who died Thursday. Arrangements were in charge of the Hollingsworth chapel, Newberg. Interment was in the Catholic cemetery.

Surviving are the widow, Katie; one brother, Eustache, Hillsboro; a nephew, Robert Klinger of Hillsboro and other relatives in occupied France.

Scraphin Klinger was born July 22, 1861, in Alsace-Lorraine, and came to the United States in 1887. He stayed one year in Elgin, Ill., and then came to Portland, moving to Tualatin in 1901. He had been in ill health since 1936.

"Enroll Now" for Civilian Defense, Richardson Urges

With enrollment in civilian defense lagging behind expectations, an urgent appeal for all patriotic citizens to register at once for volunteer home-guard service was issued Tuesday by C. T. Richardson, chairman of the county defense council.

Assignments to the various branches of civil defense can not be made until enrollment in Washington county has been completed and until all persons willing to volunteer for civil defense have made application, Richardson said.

The sooner these assignments can be made for the various branches of service, the sooner training of specialist branches can be started, Richardson declared. With the United States drawing closer to actual engagement in hostilities, the more dangerous the situation becomes, relative to civilian population.

Cards Ready
New enrollment cards for members of the civil reserves of Oregon have been printed and are available as soon as the county defense council makes its assignments.

Fighting slogan in the United States defense effort will be "Keep them flying," it has been announced. The idea behind the slogan, which is a product of the war department, is to make this the Yankee equivalent of "Thumbs up," slogan used by the British.

Hundreds of pounds of scrap aluminum are being accumulated meanwhile, in every town and community in Washington county, according to reports reaching the office of the county coordinator. The drive must be completed in time for the aluminum pick-up on July 30, at which time the scrap metal will be on its way for shipment to the smelters.

Chinese Relief Need Stressed

China needs food and clothing for its starving children, declared Mrs. Charles Richardson Jeffs, executive secretary of the United Chinese Relief drive in Portland in speaking before the Hillsboro Rotary club Thursday. Mrs. Jeffs' husband is the chief of staff of the U. S. navy Yantze patrol. She returned to this country from China in December.

The program was arranged by Mrs. B. W. Weil, local Chinese relief drive chairman, and A. L. Amacher was program chairman. Morale of the Chinese people is fine and is not weakening, according to the speaker, who held that Japan would never conquer China. Asked as to her opinion of the Japanese cabinet resignations, Mrs. Jeffs said it would indicate assumption of control by the military forces.

Characteristics of the Chinese and Japanese, Mrs. Jeffs said, are very different. The Chinese sense of humor is much like the American and the speaker held that China is no more communistic than America. The Chinese, she said, idolize the American way of life, the most flattering thing being to be an American in China. Much progress in the Chinese standard of living was made under Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek, according to the speaker.

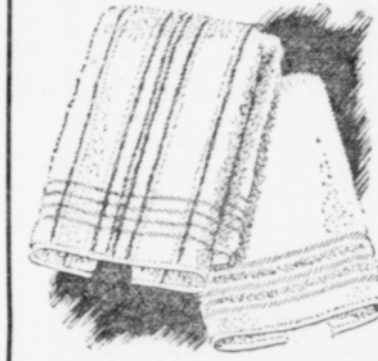

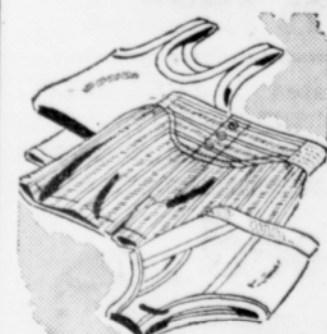
