

Sam Hulit Finds Mother's Name Carved in Nebraska Sandstone

The greatest thrill that Sam Hulit of Hillsboro experienced on his trip in the middle west was at his childhood haunts near Fairbury, Neb., where he found his mother's name, Mary Hulit, with the date October, 1881, carved upon sandstone on the farm where his folks settled in 1873.

His parents were pioneers of Nebraska, coming to this section while it was still a frontier where they had to fight prairie fires and where they often watched the Otoe Indians as they went on their annual buffalo hunts. The Otoe reservation was then located a few miles east in the Blue valley.

Farm Changed

The original Hulit home in Nebraska was a large two-room log cabin in which they lived until 1888, when they built a frame home. Sam Hulit found a great change in the old place. It was hard for him to realize it was the same farm. The creek bed where as a boy he used to fish and swim was washed out and had very little water in it. The only landmark that he vividly recalled was the large sandstone bank stretching along the creek bed. To his mother's name now are added his and Mrs. Hulit's. The large mulberry trees that once bore fruit to stain his mouth and hands still stand. Then there is the tree that he set out when they built the new house.

Those childhood memories were recalled by Hulit as he visited among old friends and relatives who still live in the Dry Branch neighborhood. Mr. and Mrs. Hulit left Fairbury on July 14, after spending a few days here. They plan to be back home about August 1 after going south through Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, then west to follow the coast route home.
