Person Named On National Loan Committee

J. M. Person, executive vice-president of the Washington Federal Savings and Loan association, Hillsboro, was appointed a member of the membership committee of the United States Savings and Loan league for 1941 according to word received this week from Paul Endicott, president of the league.

This committee consists of a group of 45 savings, building and loan men and women from as many different states who will have the responsibility for strengthening the unity of the savings and loan business in the present emergency. The agreement of the 4,000 different units of the savings and loan business in the country on fundamental policies is considered essential in the defense program and part of the responsibility of the membership committee will be to see that the various units are informed of the general policy and that they contribute their part toward its accomplishment.

The committee will meet in Miami, Fla., December 1, to draw up its report for presentation to the 49th annual convention of the United States league to be held that same week.

Sequence Numbers Established By "Sifting" Into Original List

The order in which Washington county's 198 latest selective service registrants will be subject to call was established Thursday at a national lottery in Washington, D. C.

Official order-of-call lists for Washington county's two boards have not been established as yet from a national "master list" of numbers drawn, but unofficial lists are published hereunder.

The Beaverton list, printed first, gives three numbers with each registrant's name. The left-hand figure, under the column headed "Sequence No.," tells each registrant where on the revised order-of-call list his name will be inserted. The sequence numbers were established by the Beaverton board as follows:

Process Explained
Of the 1870 men in the original draft list drawn last year, 185 men have already been called and either accepted for training or rejected for one reason or another. The next man subject to call has Sequence No. 186. The 888 registrants who enrolled on July 1 are being inserted in their call order at intervals of 19 in the original list, placing the No. 1 man of the July 1 group down 19 names from the top of the remaining list thus giving him Sequence No. S-204 (185 plus 19); placing No. 2 man 19 names farther down, giving him sequence No. S-223 (204 plus 19), etc. The middle column of figures, headed "Serial No.," lists serial numbers established by a local card shuffle following registration. These numbers are the ones read from the capsules at the national lottery. The third column to the left lists the order in which local serial numbers came up in the national draw. No. 39 coming up eighth, No. 74 coming up 17th, No. 40 coming up on the 48th draw, etc., as listed.

System Given
At Forest Grove, no unofficial list of sequence numbers has been released, but sequence numbers may be figured approximately by use of the following list:

An interval of 18 will be used to insert July 1 names into the original draft list at Forest Grove. The original draft list, with 388 names already clipped off the top, now starts with sequence No. 389. Suppose you are listed as the tenth man down on the July 1 list. Your name will be inserted 180 names down (10 times 18) on the original list, giving you sequence No. 568 (388 plus 180).

Beaverton List
This list includes only those registrants whose serial numbers were under Washington county board No. 1, with headquarters at Beaverton.
