Cal Jack, now a Commercial National bank employee, is believed to be one of the only two living members of that original "honorary dozen." William Wray, now of Santa Barbara, Cal., is the other living member and the first leader of the band. The above picture shows the bandstand and the courthouse some 13 years later, about 1907. The redwoods, it will be noted, have become full-fledged trees during the years separating this picture from the one printed by "News Then" last week.
