gravel spread to create walks and driveways from the main gates next to the 4-H building on the west side, and the truck gate on the north.

A covered passage has been constructed connecting the Farmers Union building and 4-H building, making it possible for crowds to remain under cover in case of rain.

Sound speakers will be installed in every exhibit room on the grounds for announcements during the fair and to assist the public in locating lost or strayed youngsters and other members of the family.

**Interest Mounts**  
During the last two years there has been a growing interest by outside exhibitors in space for commercial displays. The present year indicates more outside exhibitors than ever before, the records at the county fair office show.
