City Installs New Pump on Fire Wagon

Marking a successful end to a long-standing campaign on the part of Hillsboro fire department officials, a water pump capable of forcing a hose stream at the rate of 500 gallons a minute was received here last week and installed on the city's No. 1 fire wagon. Installed at the same time was a 250-gallon booster tank to be operated in connection with the new pump for roof fires and other minor conflagrations.

Purchase of the new equipment was recommended to the city council some time ago by City Manager J. W. Barney through previous recommendations of Fire Chief S. W. Melhuish and Marshal Wilbur Dillon. The city already had one pump wagon, an old Stutz, capable of forcing water at 500 gallons per minute, but as pointed out in Barney's recommendation, the city would have faced a hopeless situation if at any time during the low-water-pressure summer period the Stutz pump should have refused to operate during a serious fire.
