Summer Sessions End at Camp Adahi

Two weeks of swimming, hiking and outdoor living at Camp Adahi came to an end for Washington county Camp Fire Girls Friday night as a final council fire stamped "finis" on the activity calendar.

Top awards received at the council fire were four Trailseeker ranks, earned by Irene and Phyllis Anderson, Jeanette Neilson and Claradell Pace, all of Beaverton. Additional honors bestowed included 19 Fagot-finder awards in campcraft plus four Polliwag and two Fish awards.

Two sessions are held each summer in the Camp Fire Girls' vacation tract, located on Gales Creek north of Forest Grove on the Robert Warrens place. The total enrollment this year was 71, representing an increase of about ten over last year. Of the 71, 34 were enrolled at the first session and 37 at the second. Nine girls attended both sessions.

A number of improvements made since last year were enjoyed by the girls, the main innovations being a large fireplace in the dining hall and a dam across Gales Creek

forming a deep pool for swimming. The fireplace was built by Paul Baldwin of Hillsboro at a cost of slightly over \$200. This money is part of the proceeds from the county-wide Scout fund drive staged recently for the benefit of both Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls.

The dam was thrown up by a commercial dredging company and the resultant pool was equipped with a raft and diving board through volunteer work of a crew of men including Bob Busch, Tom Bailey, Loris Starr, Jack Searcy, and J. W. Barney, all of Hillsboro, and Ted Haby and L. P. Busch of Forest Grove.
