

Legion Juniors Pin Last Chance for Tourney Berth on Ball Clash Today

Crucial Tilt Set At Oregon City

When Hillsboro's Junior Legion baseball nine travels to Oregon City today (Thursday), it will be to stage a "last chance" battle for a berth in the state tournament.

The local lads were defeated by the Oregon City squad here Sunday, 5 to 2, in the opening game of an inter-district playoff series. The second game, with Hillsboro hoping for a victory to balance the scales and make a third and final playoff game necessary, will be played on Kelley field at Oregon City starting at 5 p. m.

Second Loss Final

If Hillsboro's hopes are realized, a neutral field will be selected for the third and deciding game. If, on the other hand, Hillsboro should suffer a second loss at the hands of Oregon City Juniors, there will be no third game and Oregon City will enter the state finals representing Districts No. 1 and 2. In the clash here Sunday Hillsboro took the lead with one run in the first inning and kept it through the second canto, which netted one run for each team. The 2-1 score remained unchanged through innings three and four. And then came the fifth. Oregon City's big inning. Three hits and a walk coupled with a Hillsboro error brought in four runs. The remainder of the game was scoreless.

Hits collected by the two nines were close, six for Hillsboro and seven for Oregon City. Hilton, on the mound for Oregon City, struck out nine, while Hillsboro's Podbielniak sent eight visitors down the whiff route. Four errors were chalked up against Hillsboro to compare with none for the Oregon City boys.
