

Farmer Killed When Team of Horses Bolt

Carl Brown, 63, Cornelius route 2 farmer, was fatally injured late last Wednesday afternoon when a team of horses bolted as he was leading them through a fence gate. According to Coroner Fred Sewell, who investigated the accident, Mr. Brown apparently was caught between a fence post and a hayrack to which the team was hitched. The horses, borrowed from a neighbor, were being led home by Brown. When the horses came home unattended, the neighbor lady feared an accident had occurred and went out in search of Mr. Brown. She found him alive alongside the fence and spoke with him for a few moments before he died.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 at St. Peter's church, Blooming, Rev. E. W. Hinrichs officiating, with interment in the Fir Lawn cemetery.

Cover Being Built

Additional bleacher seats are being set up along the north and east baselines to accommodate a large tournament crowd.

A "first come-first served" rule will be observed with regard to cars parking inside the ball park. Autos will be admitted through the gates until all space is taken for one line of cars facing the field along the north and east boundaries of the diamond. There will be ample parking space on ground adjacent to the park for all other cars.

A silk stocking shortage which has been felt keenly in Portland, according to reports, is also having its effect here although not to such a great extent. Reports from local Hillsboro clothing firms catering to women Wednesday showed a supply of all sizes still on hand but slowly diminishing.

Spurred into activity by reports that clamping down on silk imports from Japan plus curtailment of nylon and rayon production in this country will make stocking prices go high in weeks to come, women shoppers have been laying in supplies of stockings since Friday and the heavy buying is still continuing.

Hillsboro's major clothing stores were well stocked on stockings before the rush buying came, however, and stocks are still on hand. No limit on purchases has been set and prices are unchanged, store managers said.

U. S., British Warn Japan Not to Move

The not-so-far East became the world's hot spot this week as strained relations between the United States and Britain on one side and Japan on the other were drawn tighter.

Wednesday's development in the Orient saw simultaneous warnings from London and Washington to Japan concerning any invasion plans that aggressive nation might hold for Thailand, commonly known as Siam. From the United States, a note told Japan that intervention in Thailand would be considered as a threat to the Philippines.

In London, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the house of commons that the Japanese press is indulging in the same sort of publicity preparation which preceded the deal with Vichy to "protect" French Indo-China. Any Japanese move toward occupation of Thailand will be considered as endangering the security of British Burma and Malaya, Eden said.

Reports Vary
The Russo-German war, meanwhile, continued to bring conflict in the war has resulted thus far in fighting claims from Berlin and Moscow. Nazi reports said Wednesday destruction of 4,000,000 Red troops, killed, wounded and captured, but no new reports of German gains were released.

The Nazis asserted early this week that the bloody three-weeks-old battle in the Smolensk sector was finally at an end with German troops moving through in a drive toward the Russian capital.

Moscow, meanwhile, claimed continued stalemate for Nazi thrusts on all fronts and repeatedly told of heavy casualties suffered by the invaders as the result of smashing counter-attacks.

George Riley Holt, 52, resident of Hillsboro route 5 for 32 years, died Friday at his home after an extended illness. Funeral services were held at the Donelson & Sewell chapel Sunday afternoon with Rev. A. J. Sullivan of the Congregational church officiating. Interment was in the Fir Lawn cemetery.

Surviving are five brothers, Marlin, in Michigan; Muriel, Beaverton route 2; Floyd, Portland; Lloyd, Hillsboro, and Louis, in Alaska, and two sisters, Mrs. James Brooks, Holton, and Mrs. Daisy M. Plapp, Hillsboro.

George Riley Holt was born on January 25, 1889, in Michigan, and came to this county in 1909.

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Logger Killed In Woods Mishap Near Cochran

Harold John Johnson, 47, Linton, a logger, was instantly killed at 11:15 a. m. Tuesday in a woods accident at Standard Logging company operations near Cochran.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday in the Donelson and Sewell chapel.

According to an account of the accident given to Coroner Fred J. Sewell by men who were working near the fatality scene, Johnson was standing at what he believed to be a safe distance while a tree was falling but the timber struck another tree, which snapped back, striking Johnson and killing him instantly. Coroner Sewell said the man's neck was broken.

Harold Johnson was born Jan. 7, 1894, in Sweden and had come to this country 30 years ago. He had been employed as a logger in the Cochran vicinity for the past five months. He has no known survivors.

Fire Destroys Grain Crop

Three large stacks of unseparated grain representing three-fourths of the entire crop of George Chlebowski, 1 1/2 miles south of Reedville, were destroyed by fire late Wednesday afternoon when a spark from a tractor caught in a tinder-dry pile.

The fire also burned the tractor and about half of the grain which had already been separated and sacked. The loss was estimated at about 400 bushels.
