

### County Softball Playoffs Outlined At Meeting Here

Plans for the District No. 5 (Washington county) softball playoffs to select a team to represent the district in the state tournament at Oregon City, August 24 to 28, were outlined here Tuesday night at a meeting of Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Beaverton and Benny Slope league representatives.

The double-elimination playoff schedule follows:

Monday, August 18—at Beaverton: Forest Grove vs. Tualatin, 8 p. m.; Second game, Hillsboro vs. Benny Slope.

Tuesday, August 19—at Hillsboro: First game, Losers of first night's games play each other, 8 p. m.; Second game, Winners of first night's games play each other.

Wednesday, August 20—at Forest Grove: First game, Winners of first game Tuesday play losers of second game Tuesday; Second game, Exhibition softball.

Thursday, August 21—Home grounds of Wednesday's winners. Bye team of Wednesday will play winners of Wednesday's game for District No. 5 championship and right to enter state tournament.

### Six Draftees To Complete Grove Quota

Next quota to be filled by the Forest Grove draft board will call six selective service recruits, but the board has not yet been notified as to the time these men will be called. Seven men are being sent by the Beaverton board on Monday, August 18.

The six men to be sent on Forest Grove's next call will complete that board's gross quota of 436 men, which takes into account 385 men credited to the board as enlistments in both the Forest Grove and Hillsboro National Guard units.

The Beaverton board, which receives no credit for National Guard enlistments, must send 122 more men to fill a gross quota corresponding with the 436 total at Forest Grove, it was learned here this week.

Brown Talks

Vic Brown, state chairman of Legion baseball, called attention to the fact that 19 teams were entered in Legion junior competition in the state of Oregon this year. In the nation at large, some 600,000 boys are embraced by Legion ball, he said.

Paul L. Patterson, executive advisor to local tournament committees and past commander reported on plans for the playoffs to start here the next day. Rollie Truitt added a bit of color by naming some of the past and present big league stars who have come up through the Legion junior ranks. Coaches and captains of the four finalist teams were interviewed briefly and recognition was given to the Burns team, in the state finals here for three years in succession.

With conclusion of the radio broadcast, distinguished guests were introduced by Verne McKinney, Legion post past-commander, and a drawing held to select teams and opponents for opening day games. Team captains drew from a bowl held high by Vic Brown. The numbers, in order, came up as follows: Albany, 3; Burns, 2; Hillsboro, 4; and Kamm Kids, 1. By previous ruling, the opening day games were thus set up—Kamm Kids vs. Burns in the first game and Albany vs. Hillsboro in the second—with first teams listed being the visitors.

As the banquet opened, an address of welcome was given by Hugh S. Rogers and response by Vic Brown.

A parade of the Albany Legion Junior drum corps on Hillsboro streets immediately preceded Saturday events at the park, where the brilliantly uniformed youngsters went through fancy maneuvers and sounded taps in an opening ceremony.

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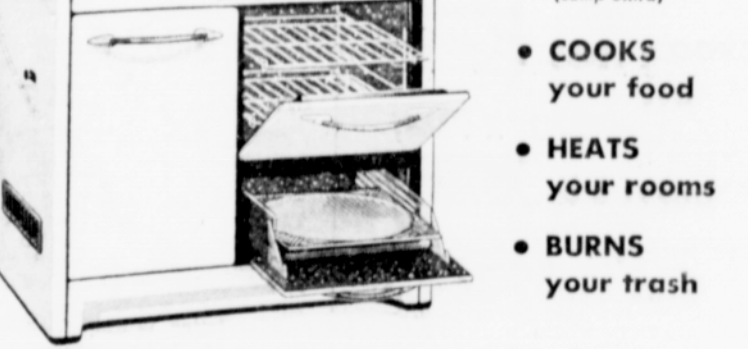
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
