Telephone Lines Ordered Tax-Exempt

The state tax commission has issued orders exempting from taxation approximately 700 non-profit cooperative or privately owned telephone lines in the state of Oregon, including 40 companies in Washington county, which announced this week by Earl Day, division commissioner.

These exemptions were made in conformance with Chapter 11, Oregon laws, 1941. Any lines not having completed the requirements of the law and which can or care to qualify for exemption should get in touch with the State Tax Commission immediately, Day said.

Service Station Rising on Main Street Corner

Construction was well under way this week on a new Texaco super-service station being built on the northwest corner of First and Main streets. Adolph Mohr is the contractor.

The steel re-inforced concrete building will be 62 by 58 feet in its largest dimensions and is set back some 25 feet from the sidewalk on both Main street and First avenue sides. Three gas pumps and three tanks having a total capacity of 2,190 gallons are to be installed. The spacious one-story building will include a crease-hoist room, a

fire service department, a car-washing room, a tune-up room and a 24 by 30-foot show room in addition to a small office. Eight workmen are regularly employed on the building project, which is expected to take another six weeks.

Wrecking of the garage behind Donelson and Sewell's mortuary here, meanwhile, was completed Wednesday, paving the way for a major house-moving job. The present building is to be moved back to make way for a new chapel, construction to start within the next week.
