and will remain open until 10 p. m. at night. No charge will be made after the gates open in the morning until evening. Events will move along at a rapid pace with a special feature scheduled for 2 p. m. in the auditorium under the direction of the Granges of Washington county. An excellent program has been prepared. It has been announced.

At 8:30 p. m. in the auditorium, the "Harvest Queen" will be chosen. The coronation ceremony and the Queen's ball will follow. Music for the event will be furnished by Monte Brooks and his band of Portland.

Friday the gates will open at 9 a. m. with a long series of 4-H club events to fill the program throughout the day. At 2 p. m. a program arranged by the Farmer Union locals of the county will be given in Shute park auditorium.

Saturday will be homecoming day with a special program in charge of the Pioneers and Native Sons and Daughters association. A special program will be given from the stage on the grounds at 3 p. m. following the mutt dog show, an annual feature under direction of the Hillsboro Rotary club.

At 8 p. m. there will be a fireworks display presented through the courtesy of the Shell Oil company and under direction of the Hillsboro firemen. The fireworks will be followed by a big dance in Shute park auditorium to close the 1941 fair.

Besides the entertainment features there will be Hobby Hall, filled with odd and interesting exhibits and bigger than ever before; and the fall flower show in charge of the Hillsboro Garden club and participated in by all Washington county garden clubs.

**Aljen Re-entry to U. S. Explained**  
Aliens resident in the United States, desiring to depart for temporary visits to Canada, are informed that in order to re-enter the United States from Canada they must have in their possession a document known as a re-entry permit, a resident alien's border crossing identification card, or an entirely new immigration visa. Re-entry permits are issued by the immigration and naturalization service at Washington, D. C., upon applications made through local immigration officers, and require four weeks, ordinarily, but may be expedited by the use of air mail postage. A fee of \$3 is charged for such permits.
