

Fiesta to Welcome 1941 "Harvest Queen"

A fiesta of "Good Neighbors" will welcome the 1941 "Harvest Queen" to be selected by an official and final count of votes next Thursday night, August 28, it was announced this week by Mrs. H. H. Stannard and Hillsboro Junior Women's club members, jointly planning the event.

The fiesta will be in three outstanding episodes told in dance, pantomime and tableau, all of which will be presented preceding the official announcement of the queen.

Frances Campton has been selected as soloist. Groups presenting the various episodes include girls of the 1941 Hillsboro high school graduating class in the "Festival of Roses" and a group of girls from St. Matthews school in "The Dance of the Milk Maids."

Pantomime features will be the lack of the Junior Women's club and Past Noble Grands' club of the Rebekah lodge.

Helen Wick's dancing school will have a part, and the Harvest Court of last year will be featured in the first episode of the festival.

Washington county mayors are scheduled to confer the degree of mastery on the princesses and the Harvest Queen.

Candidates for "Harvest Queen" found themselves in a tight race for the "Treasure Chest" Saturday night when the preliminary count was made, revealing that while two of the girls were only a few votes apart, the leads over the remaining three were not of sufficient consequence to assure anyone of final victory. Sale of 100 additional tickets to the events in the auditorium would place any one of the three girls well in the lead of the two at the head of the list. The girls will make a report on ticket sales and standings again Friday, which will be the last report before the auditing committee makes its final official count Thursday night, August 28.

Announcement of the winner will be made only when the crown is placed on the head of the "Harvest Queen" at 9 p. m.
