Pyrotechnic Display Planned As Concluding Event at Fair

Brilliant new set pieces and aerial bombardments, many being exhibited for the first time, will be seen here in a pyrotechnic display to be sponsored by the Shell Oil company as a feature of the Washington county fair.

The new display, titled "Grand Salute to America," is loaded with color and novelty from start to finish. Over five months have been devoted to the planning and perfecting of the new display, according to John Kovaly, local Shell manager.

Statue Set Gigantic "Of particular interest will be the gigantic 'Statue of Liberty' set. Magnificently designed, this towering figure, surmounted by a huge blazing torch, will close the show. And the opening salvo, exploding at a great altitude with vivid flashes and terrific reports, will be seen and heard for a distance of seventy-five miles."

"During the course of the show will be seen national color batteries, star-spangled shells, parachute eagles, skybird wheels, falls of Niagara, floral bouquets and a great variety of beautiful surprises. These are in addition to the usual bombardment of multiple report shells and rockets which will literally paint the heavens in fiery colors."

"The exhibition being free, huge crowds are expected to witness it. Expert pyrotechnic men have been engaged to fire the show, which will be set off promptly at 8 p. m. Saturday, August 30, last night of the fair."

(Continued from page 6) production will be close to normal levels. It is reported that the substitutes being used for aluminum and nickel are satisfactory. Higher prices are to be expected.

No shortage of any food is anticipated. If rationing of certain foods, such as in the last war, is imposed, it will be very limited in extent.

In certain areas, notably those which contain major defense industries, there is a very grave shortage, and rents are soaring. This is one of the toughest problems the country has on its hands now.

Shortage exist in a few areas, and utility experts say this is largely due to the government's "anti-utility" policy which has prevented much private expansion. The utilities, however, are now planning an ambitious development program, and are confident of their ability to meet the demand. In most of the country there is plenty of juice for both industrial and household needs.

What it all adds up to is that we will have less non-military production of a good many commodities—but the pinch will not be anywhere near so severe as scare rumors might lead us to anticipate. It is generally believed that the average price level will go 10 or 15 per cent higher, and most government experts do not seem to feel that any danger of real inflation has yet appeared. Great hopes are pinned on higher taxes as a weapon against inflation.

They will deprive the consumer of a large part of the increased income which war spending is producing. In addition, congress will undoubtedly pass some kind of price-control legislation.

Emphasis is being placed now on making goods give better service. Economists tell us to drive our cars slower to save motors, rubbers and gas; to have our shoes re-soled and our clothes repaired, instead of buying new. That is good advice.
