British, Soviets Push Into Iran; Laval is Shot

The war in Europe spread into a new land this week as British and Russian troops, driving in from opposite sides, launched a strategic invasion move into oil-rich Iran, which borders on India, Russia and British-occupied Iraq.

By Wednesday, British imperial troops were in possession of several oil pipelines and refineries, one of the latter being capable of producing from 200,000 to 300,000 barrels of gasoline daily, or enough to supply the entire royal navy.

Resistance Light

First reports of fighting in Iran pictured the defenders as putting up only token resistance against the British and Russians, and despite defense-minded declarations from various Iranian sources, collapse of all resistance in the Persian state within three days is expected, according to British sources.

Latest word from the capital of Iran on Wednesday said Shah Reza Kahn Pahlavi, the country's ruler, is aware of his people's hopeless situation and is convinced that an "armistice" giving British and Russian forces police power over his nation should be arranged.

A would-be assassin's bullet Wednesday wounded Pierre Laval, former French vice-premier under Marshal Petain, and strong advocate of collaboration with Hitler, as he attended an anti-communist demonstration in German occupied France. His condition was described as serious but doctors, after removing the lead, predicted he would live.

Deaf Wounded

The same would-be assassin, identified as Paul Collette, 21-year-old communist, also shot Marcel Deat, former French air minister and another collaborationist. Deat's wound, in the arm, was not serious.

Along the Soviet-Nazi fighting line, little gain was made by either side during the past week but Nazi forces Wednesday were believed ready to seize the port of Tallinn, capital of Estonia. Trapped on all sides by land, Russian residents and troops posted in the city were reported to be firing all buildings in preparation for a mass escape by sea. A red glow over the city, starting Tuesday night and continuing Wednesday, was reportedly seen from as far away as Helsinki, Finland, 50 miles across the gulf.

The two-day caravan tour, for which detailed plans are now being worked out, will travel through Hillsboro and Forest Grove to the Wilson river highway approach at Glenwood, via the new highway to the Laval M. Graham bridge for dedication ceremonies and on to Tillamook for an evening banquet.

The return trip on Saturday will take in two other new stretches of highway, the new Neakahnie mountain road and the Sunset camp-Manning section of the Wolf creek road, which is to be dedicated on that day.

The general public is being invited to make reservations for the trip through the Oregon State Motor association, the East Side Commercial club or the Portland chamber of commerce.

The Wilson River highway and the newest extension of the Wolf Creek road, both to afford shorter, faster routes to the Oregon coast, are being rushed to completion in preparation for a caravan tour of the two roads set for September 19 and 20. One of the last sections of Wilson River road to be graded and surfaced is the 1 1/2-mile stretch near Mill bridge in Tillamook county, shown in the top picture. Trucks and equipment are shown moving through this sector in one-way traffic. Deepest cut on the Wilson river route and one of the deepest in the entire state highway system is seen in the middle picture. Some 325,000 yards of rock and earth were removed to create the cut, which displaced original plans for a tunnel. Requiring one year to dig, the cut is 170 feet deep at the center. Work on one of the portals of a tunnel located on the Sunset camp-Manning sector of the Wolf creek highway, also to be traveled by the caravan, is shown in the bottom picture. The 775-foot bore near Strassel, will eliminate the winding Wolf Creek highway approach through Timber. (Cuts Courtesy Oregonian.)

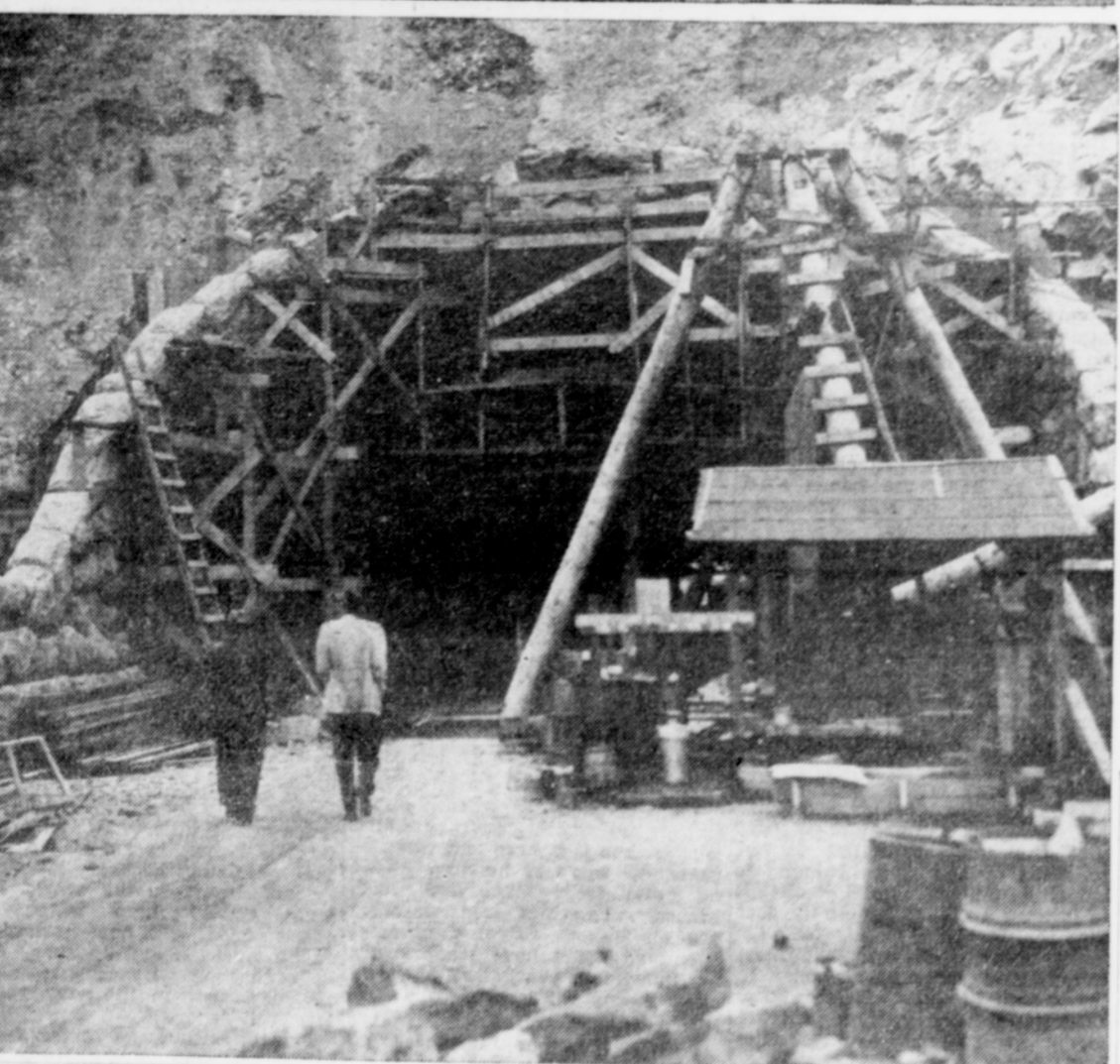
