

Plans Set, Premiums Listed for 31st Annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition

Dairy Section Largest of Many Divisions

Outstanding premiums in over 20 separate divisions of the 31st annual Pacific International Livestock exposition to be held at Portland, October 4 to 11, inclusive, are offered on the general livestock premium list now ready for distribution, according to announcement of President T. B. Wilcox, Jr., and General Manager O. M. Plummer.

The premium lists may be had by addressing 308 Wilcox building, Portland, it was added.

At the great "Livestock University of the West," beef shorthorns, Herefords, Aberdeen-Angus and milking shorthorns with fat steers of the 4-H club exhibits will fill the west section. Professor B. W. Rodenwald will be superintendent.

Judge is Veteran

Fat steers will be judged by Professor Alex McDonald of California, both in open and 4-H club divisions. This is his 13th year as judge. Professor Kenneth C. Ikeler of Maryland will place the ribbons on the beef shorthorns. Professor J. C. Holbert, Iowa State college, has been invited to make the awards in the Herefords and Aberdeen-Angus, and Hugh Nisbet of Port Ludlow, Wash., is judge of the milking shorthorns.

The dairy section is the largest division of all. Guy Finley of Yakima, Wash., will be superintendent and judges are as follows:

Holsteins and Brown Swiss, Professor H. P. Ewalt of Oregon; Jerseys and Ayrshires, Prof. D. L. Fourn, Idaho; Guernseys, Ivan Loughary of Idaho; H. M. King of British Columbia, associate judge. There will be a sale of Jerseys on Thursday, October 9.

The sheep and goat department is as usual in charge of Prof. O. M. Nelson, superintendent from the beginning, and judges are as follows:

Fine wool breeds, George Philip of California; coarse wool breeds, Frank Brown, Jr., of Oregon. Tom Drummond of Anaconda, Montana, has been invited to make awards in the medium wool breeds. Angora goats will be judged by Glenn Hogg and the three breeds of milk goats by A. R. Fenton.

The heavy draft horse division

is made up of Percherons, Belgians, Shires and Clydesdales, and will be judged by Prof. J. C. Holbert, Iowa State college, Des Moines, and Kenneth C. Ikeler of Maryland. The famous six-horse hitch will be seen in this division and in action in the driving contest in the arena.

Oliver Heads

Prof. A. W. Oliver of Oregon is superintendent of swine and Prof. E. F. Ferrin of the University of Minnesota, St. Paul, will judge all of the breeds, Poland Chinas, Duroc Jerseys, Chester Whites, Berkshires, Hampshires and Yorkshires.

J. C. Penney Hall houses "Camp Plummer," the home of boys and girls 4-H club work. This is one of three such "camps" given official recognition by the United States government and has as its chairman Miss Madge Reese of the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., with H. C. Seymour, Oregon state club leader, as its manager, assisted by state club leaders of all the northwestern states.

Sale is Set

Four-H club fat cattle, hogs and sheep of the boys and girls will be sold Wednesday, October 8, at 10 a. m. The Portland union stock yards have always taken a very active part in 4-H club activities, giving financial support for pig club premiums and making available dormitory space for the several hundred club members in attendance. J. C. Penney Hall is also headquarters for the Future Farmers of America. Earl Cooley has charge of this activity.

The Horse Show is in charge of the veteran manager, A. P. Fleming, who will bring together outstanding exhibits from all parts of the country. There will be thirteen performances. Elliott and Nesbit rodeo will furnish the thrills and spills, while other spectacular attractions will be announced later.

The fat stock carlots of cattle, hogs and sheep will be housed in the Union stock yards as usual, as will pens of five Hereford bulls to be sold at auction with the single animals in the regular Hereford sale on Friday, October 10. Open fat steers, lambs and hogs in both carlots and singles will be sold in the union stock yards arena on Thursday morning, October 9.

The industrial section in charge of B. C. McHenry will occupy a large part of the front of the Pacific International Livestock exposition structure. The entirely new exhibit of the United States

army will have space in the main entrance and is expected to be of absorbing interest and of greatest educational value at this stressful time.

The fish and game department of Oregon, assisted by the United States department of fisheries is a never ending source of interest to young and old, each year finding a different set-up.

Counters Exhibit

C. D. Minton is in charge of the manufactures and land products show, where each year a majority of the counties of Oregon display a cross section of their productions.

The wool and mohair show, in charge of "Pacific Wool Growers," will afford a fine opportunity to see fleeces of various breeds and to witness the activities of the Women's Auxiliary of the Oregon Wool Growers association in charge of their president, Mrs. A. S. Boyd of Baker.

The dairy products show will be in charge of George Jacobsen with Dr. G. H. Wilster in an advisory capacity. This is admitted to be the leading dairy products show of the country with medals and diplomas highly valued.

Mrs. William Kehrli is secretary of the Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock association, which will hold forth in a big way in commodious T. B. Wilcox hall.

"Truth in meats" exhibits will be in charge of U. S. Burt, assisted by Davenport Phelps, western representative of the national livestock and meat board, and is devoted to an educational display of all kinds of meats from wholesale to retail cuts. It will stress a knowledge of various grades and their place in the diet.

Pacific International Kennel club under charge of Harry M. Powell will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 9, 10, and 11.
