### A. A. S. Stresses Need For Bicycle Training

Youthful bicyclists, who will be the drivers of tomorrow, must be taught traffic safety and traffic rules for bicycles, Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association, said in urging parents to supervise more carefully the use of bicycles by their sons and daughters.

"If parents will assume greater responsibility in connection with such bicycle use, many of the 700 deaths and 35,000 injuries annually to bicyclists will be prevented," Dr. McDaniel said. "About half of these involve children from 5 to 14 years of age."

"Here are several suggestions for parents, recommended by the American Automobile association with which the Oregon State Motor association is affiliated: "See that all proper safety equipment is included when bicycles are purchased. Make regular inspections to assure that this equipment is in safe operating condition at all times. Co-operate in enforcing rules and regulations issued by schools and police. Prohibit young children from riding in busy traffic streets until they have developed skill. See that all learning is done in parks, playgrounds or other safe places away from traffic. Explain what might happen if unnecessary chances are taken, or if foolish tricks are performed; and prohibit smaller brothers and sisters from riding on the handlebars or crossbar."

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Two registered Holstein cows owned by the O. S. C. dairy department have just been cited by the national Holstein-Friesian association for having completed herd test records of more than 629 pounds of butterfat per year, or 3 1/2 times the country's dairy cow average. In four years under test Oregon Inka Bess Mae has made the following records: 425.9, 596.5, 545.5, and now 649.7 pounds of fat in 365 days. Oregon Inka Bess Ida, the other cow, has annual records of 559.9, 520.6, 631.5, and 629.4.

### Motor Club Lists

#### Basic Safety Rules

Principles of safe driving and walking are as simple and important as the A. B. C.'s, according to the public safety department of the Oregon State Motor association. Heavy summer driving with the increased danger of automobile mishaps brings a new responsibility upon both the driver and the pedestrian.

Keep your place in the line of traffic and avoid weaving. Keep a steady pace and avoid spurts of high speed.

Take plenty of time for trips. Get an early start.

Avoid passing on hills, curves, and at street intersections.

Take a restful position at the wheel. Grasp the wheel lightly to avoid tenseness. Avoid eye strain caused by staring ahead.

Adjust the driver's seat so there will be no strain in reaching the accelerator and brakes.

Drive within your headlight range at night. Check brakes so they will stop within the distances that you can see at night.

Keep on the right side of the road. Be sure the car is in good me-

chanical condition—brakes, tires, and steering wheel in particular.

**Pedestrians**  
Obey traffic signals and officers at controlled intersections. Look carefully in both directions before crossing streets. Never cross streets or highways from between parked cars. Walk facing oncoming traffic when on rural highways. Wear or carry something white when walking on highways after dark.
