

Budget Board Is Appointed; Pool Considered

Appointment of a six-man budget committee and preliminary discussion of municipal finances for the coming year highlighted a special session of the city council held Thursday night in the city hall.

Members of the budget committee are H. L. Mackenzie, Dr. J. O. R. L. Nye Bristol, E. J. McVane, Morris W. Hill and R. C. Bush. A rough budget will be prepared by the citizens' group and presented to the city council at a special meeting, sometime shortly after the next regular session Tuesday night.

First municipal action toward a Hillsboro swimming pool was taken by the city fathers, with appointment of a committee to investigate facts and figures in this connection. On this committee are City Engineer J. W. Barney and Councilmen J. L. S. J. J. A. Griffith and W. V. McKimsey.

Parking Discussed
Discussion of the parking problem considered strict enforcement of laws prohibiting double parking and revision of present traffic ordinances to set 20 minutes as the parking limit in restricted areas, but no action was taken, pending expressions of sentiment from the people. Also discussed was the matter of stop-and-go traffic lights for certain busy intersections of Baseline street.

Income from the State park pavilion as compared with floor damages caused by skates was considered. It was concluded that income was more than adequate to pay for damages and the council agreed to permit continued use of the pavilion for that amusement.

Permit Granted
Permission was granted the Four-square Gospel church to hold meetings in the Linklater property across from the courthouse provided approval of the city manager and fire marshal is obtained. The church formerly had been granted permission to hold the meetings on a lot between the city hall and the telephone office, but negotiations for use of this property were unsuccessful.

The council granted a permit for a fireworks display to be staged on the last night of the county fair and approved installation of gasoline tanks for the new service station being erected at First and Main.

Thyng Appointed

Appointment by Governor Charles Sprague of George Thyng as Beaverton district justice of peace to succeed H. J. Valentine, resigned, was announced Saturday at Salem. Thyng has served in the same capacity before.

Hunt, Berkeley, Cal.; and four brothers, Walter and Robert J. McMonies, Portland, and Fred J. McMonies, Pasadena, Cal. Ida Jane McMonies was born at Brampton, Ontario, Can., August 22, 1881. She was married in October, 1894, to C. A. Raymond, who passed away in 1900, and married again on January 1, 1912, to John W. McBurney, who died in 1933. She held the longest continuous membership in the Gaston Congregational church and was a member of Zenith Rebekah lodge.
