TAMALE PIE

One tablespoon butter or other shortening. 1 large onion minced fine. 1 No. 2½ size can tomatoes. 1 No. 2 size can yellow corn. 1 large green pepper minced fine. Fry onion light brown in butter, add corn, tomatoes, green peppers, salt and pepper. When this comes to a boil add enough yellow corn meal to make a not-too-thick mush. Take from stove and add 1 can ripe olives cut fine. 1½ pounds hamburger. 2 well beaten eggs. 2 tablespoons chili powder or enough to suit taste, mixing all well. Grease a large pan, or roaster, pour in and bake 45 minutes before taking from oven. Pour 1 can of tomato hot sauce over the top. Mrs. Hazel Christofferson, Helvetia.

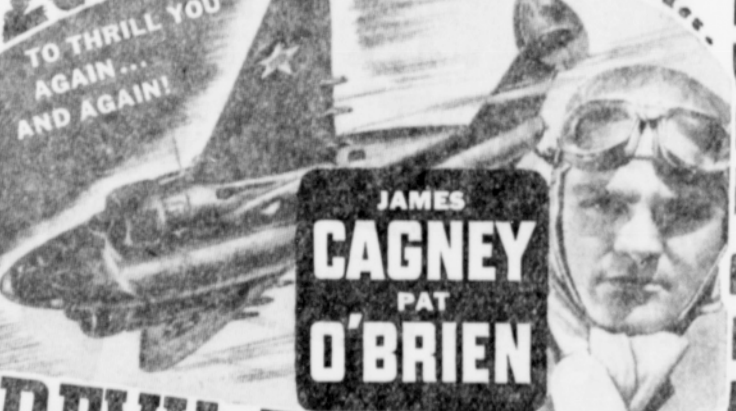
