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dividual farm plan to determine the extent his farm can contribute to agriculture's task in national defense.

The goals for 1942 call for the largest production in the history of American agriculture—15 percent higher than the 1924 to 1929 average. But it will be an expansion only of the necessary commodities, and we will not have to over-expand our present farming operations to get it. Reserves of wheat and feed grains are adequate for increased production of livestock products. No material increase of total crop acreage will be necessary.

MacKenzie Gets Look at Fords

H. L. MacKenzie, Hillsboro Ford dealer, returned this week from Seattle, where he attended a dealer-salesman preview of the 1942 Ford line. The announcement meeting, held in Seattle's civic auditorium, was staged for the benefit of more than 600 dealers and salesmen from all parts of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana.

MacKenzie stated that the new line of Ford cars for 1942 far surpassed his expectations in beauty of line and in performance. "The new six cylinder unit which this year is the running mate of the Ford V-8 is a honey," he declared, "but the entire line has styling, both exterior and interior, which brings to the public a new conception of motoring heretofore unknown in the low-price field."

NEW PLAN FOR JUDGING

A method for judging dairy cattle by classification and production rather than by a hard and fast process of scoring is described and commented upon by H. P. Ewalt and Roger W. Morse of Oregon State college, in a new extension circular No. 374. The authors believe that the classification system has merit, particularly in 4-H club, PFA, special breed shows, and county fairs.

According to the Oregon State Motor association, the Federal Government has let contracts for the purchase of more than 2,000 trailers, to be used as "stopgap" housing in seven crowded defense areas.

April, 1941, broke all records for the sale of new passenger cars according to the Oregon State Motor association. During that month 489,074 new passenger cars were registered. This beats the previous mark of April 1929 when 481,675 passenger cars were sold.

Some commodities during the last war brought many hardships to farmers and to the nation as a whole. The farm program provides machinery for adjusting production to needs and we can avoid the bad after-effects of over-expansion by making full use of the machinery.

While increased production of many products was asked, 1942 goals for most basic export crops will be lower than last year, it was pointed out. Export markets have shrunk steadily during the war, and reserve supplies have been built up in this country, making increased production unnecessary. These commodities include cotton, tobacco, and wheat.

Acreage Reduced
The 1942 national wheat acreage allotment has been reduced from 62,000,000 acres to the 55,000,000 acre minimum set by the agricultural adjustment act of 1938. While the potato goal is set at 3,060,000 acres, slightly higher than 1941, it is considerably under the 3,132,000 acre average for 1936-40.

"It is just as important to national defense and our future national welfare to hold production of some commodities in check as that we increase supplies of others," Kamna said. "Over-expansion of

BEAVERTON—Of building construction approximating \$67,200 which has been completed or started in Beaverton during the present year, approximately \$48,300 is located on lots formerly owned by the town, property acquired by court action and which is thus sold to place the land back into active town use. Most recently acquired is 26 tracts of clear titled, insurable land lying with the town limits. These will be combined with more than 80 lots now held, and sold as homesites. It is stipulated that residences be completed thereon within one year from date of sale.

A request made by Recorder R. C. Doty that Beaverton be classified as being within the Portland defense area has been granted by the federal housing administration and thus assures homeowners of financial assistance in building costs.

Information concerning the properties to be sold is obtainable at the city hall where Recorder Doty will be able to give full details.

Study Numbering System
A numbering system for the town residences is now being studied, having been planned for some time past. Town officials have expressed the hope that such a system may be possible shortly.

How to Report a Fire
A bulletin explaining the proper method of reporting a fire has been issued by Beaverton Fire

Chief Archie Olson. He states that the number so designated in the Beaverton phone book is to be used only for calling the fire department, and he requests that spectators not rush to fires, thus obstructing the safety of firemen and making prompt fire service impossible. Permission to start fires is to be secured from a fire warden.
