Mr. and Mrs. Claude Straughan returned to their home in Amarillo, Texas after a month's visit with relatives here.

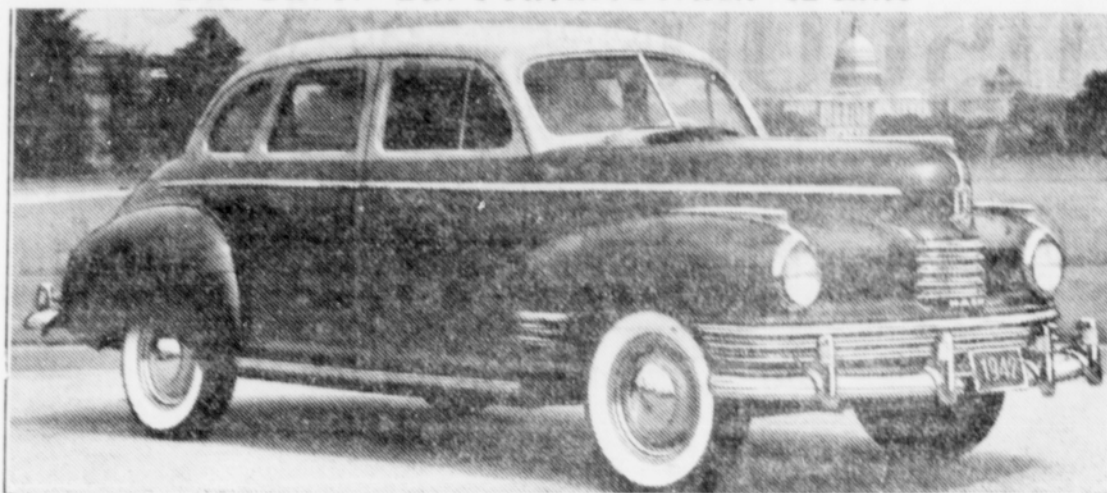
Gerald Engelen Honored

'42 Nash to Show Here Saturday

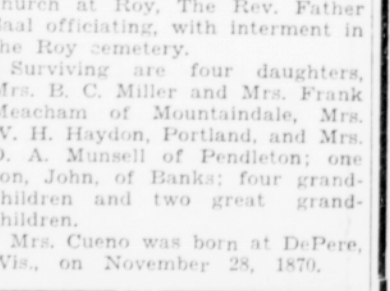

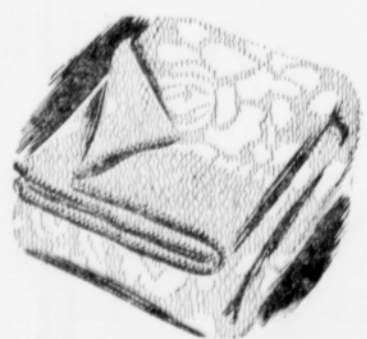

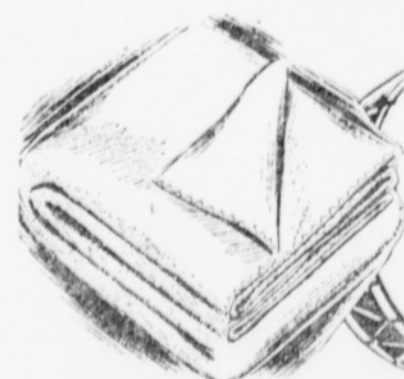
