County Coordinator Leon Davis cited the need for completing organization as soon as possible because a trial mobilization may be held sometime this month.

Need for more civil reserves registration is cited by County Chairman C. T. Richardson, who called attention to the fact that very little interest has been shown by the average citizen in registering for home defense. Many people, he said, feel that there is only one chance in ten thousand of Washington county ever being invaded and consequently are not much interested. However, the chairman declared, this is the spirit that placed many European countries under the heel of Adolf Hitler and in case of invasion would cost this country an immense loss.

"When we advise that as many as 200 people should be members of some of these sub-committees or divisions, you can readily see that it will take about 3,000 to properly set up all divisions correctly," declared the chairman. "When we further advise that out of a population of approximately 42,000 in Washington county only about 600 have registered, you can see that only one person in 70 has so far shown any interest, you can readily see that the population is not cooperating to the extent that it should."

"Registration and allotting in no way obligates anyone to serve at any time. It is assumed that this organization will only be used in actual case of necessity, or in practically all cases when this country is invaded."

Deputy Sheriff Dick Bush took fingerprints of all defense council members in attendance, who had not been previously printed.

New Business Block Being Built In Beaverton; Library Gaining

BEAVERTON A new building is being erected on Broadway by Otto Keil and Francis Holboke, proprietors of the Thrifty market. The building is 62,800 feet in size and will be constructed entirely of concrete. It comprises one main floor and a smaller room, both of which are already rented by firms. Builders are Waale and Camplan of Portland, who plan to complete it within 90 days. As far as possible all materials are being secured through Beaverton firms.

Contributions Made
A report issued by the North-western Christian home at Beaverton reveals that members and friends of the church have expressed an appreciative interest in benevolent activities. They have made a contribution toward furthering such work. Contributions for the maintenance of benevolence from the northwestern area for the past year shows a gain over last year of \$903.20 for the area, composed of Montana,

North Idaho, South Idaho, Washington and Oregon. The opinion is expressed that during the coming year a special effort must be made to overcome increased costs and such difficulties arising from the present world stress. It is pointed out that with maintenance being already increased approximately six per cent a very real problem is presented.
