

Nazi Troops Push Toward Soviet Capital

In what is described as probably the most decisive battle of the eastern campaign, Hitler's Nazi legions were moving slowly toward Moscow, capital of the Soviet union, and claims were made that German troops already were seriously threatening the Denets river basin and the rich, industrial Don valley.

While Russian sources stressed the Moscow thrust as the more important of the two German advance sectors, Berlin spokesmen refused to point out either as the main Nazi offensive, preferring to publicize both as integral parts of a co-ordinated grand smash.

Massed revolt continued in Yugoslavia and other Nazi-occupied countries, meanwhile, and German troops were being poured into trouble centers to quell disorders and open rebellion. Other top news stories of the week concerned President Roosevelt's statement to the effect that this nation's neutrality act should be revised to permit armed American ships to carry British war supplies into belligerent ports; a reported running battle of unseen and unidentified ships off the coast of Brazil, sinking of the American-owned freighter I. C. White, a tornado which struck Kansas City, killing three, a tropical storm which swept in on Florida and Georgia from the West Indies, leaving a toll of at least nine dead in its wake, and the failure of German-British negotiations to exchange wounded prisoners of war.

Ardis Ellingson Has Leading Role

FOREST GROVE, Miss Ardis Ellingson of Hillsboro has been selected for one of the four leading roles in the annual homecoming play at Pacific university.

The dates for the play are October 30 and 31, the second night being open to the public.

Dr. Walter C. Giersbach, new president of Pacific university, has just begun a speaking tour which, for the month of October, will take him on a circuit of 6000 miles from the Canadian border to Omaha, Neb. All in all, he will deliver 27 addresses to alumni, religious and educational groups. He will return to the campus to be present at the rededication of Old College hall, at which time he will be a co-speaker with Dr. Paul Raver, of the Bonneville Power administration.

A student well known to residents of Washington county, John Stahle, recent graduate of Pacific university, has been called to service. Stahle was very active in dramatics and speech work at Pacific university, and had taught five weeks at Lone before he was notified of his call. He is the first member of the 1941 graduating class of Pacific to be called from his profession into the army.

Clergy See Freedom of Press Linked with Religious Freedom

Fundamental importance of America's democratic freedoms—of press, speech and religion—and their close inter-relationship were stressed by Hillsboro clergymen Sunday in church recognition of National Newspaper Week.

Rev. R. L. Putnam, Christian church pastor, had the following to say in his church bulletin under the heading "Free Press and Free Speech":

"The close relationship between a free press and free speech with religious freedom causes us to ponder real seriously in these days lest these freedoms be abridged or lost in this country as has happened of recent months in Europe. This rite and heritage we must not lose. Let everyone of us good Americans, citizens and Christians never cease in our fight to maintain these freedoms."

Sullens, Congregational minister, in his Sunday sermon, declared that the nation is responding heartily to National Newspaper Week because in these days citizens are very conscious of the high place the press holds in moulding public opinion and in educating the public to a better understanding of the principles of democracy.

In Hillsboro, he said, "we are proud of our own newspaper and its family of workers, not only because of its artistic quality as a newspaper but because of the high ideals reflected in its pages."

Rev. W. T. Magford, Baptist minister, praised the service of American newspapers in his "Harvest Day" sermon. (Details in story on local page, this section).

State "Declares War" on Unlicensed Account Solicitors

Unlicensed operators are unlawfully soliciting accounts for collection throughout the state of Oregon and thousands of dollars worth of accounts have been obtained by out of state collection agencies who are not licensed or bonded to do a collection agency business in this state, it was warned here Monday in a statement from an Oregon real estate department official.

Effective July 1, 1941, the law provides that anyone soliciting accounts for collection in Oregon must display on demand a solicitor's card issued by this department, showing that they are licensed to do business in the state of Oregon.

Many complaints are received by the state department from merchants and professional men stating that they have given accounts to various collectors or solicitors, upon the promise that they would purchase the accounts or collect them for a nominal fee. The merchant is then unable to receive a remittance on these accounts from the collection agency, it was explained.

Bond Required

All licensed collectors in Oregon are required to give a \$3000 bond which guarantees to the merchant that he will receive his money. If you give accounts to an unlicensed collector you do not have this protection, the official said.

It was also pointed out that when accounts are given to unlicensed operators from outside the state of Oregon that neither the real account owner nor the state of Oregon has any jurisdiction in the matter. The fraudulent collector can only be arrested on Oregon soil.

Asking for support and co-operation in apprehending the unlicensed collectors, the state official urged all business and professional men to demand that anyone soliciting accounts for collection show a solicitor's card and if he cannot do so, to order his arrest immediately and wire the state real estate department collect.

In Norwalk, Conn., police officers take pictures of school children seen violating safety rules or traffic laws and show slides of the photographs during the school's safety-talk period the following week. By doing this instead of lecturing the children, the officers seldom again make the same mistake, according to the Oregon State Motor association.

Scrap Metal Demand Ends Car "Graveyards"

If the metals in the literally millions of obsolete automobiles now in junk yards along the highways and byways were reclaimed, it would not only provide valuable defense material, but would also rid the country of conspicuous eyesores, according to Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association.

Dr. McDaniel said that federal defense agencies are now organizing a broad program for converting scrap metals into production channels and the local A. A. A. club will cooperate in calling attention to "local automobile graveyards" which offer valuable materials.
