Richardson Talks Defense Program

Nazi Troops Within 65 Miles Of Moscow

Nazi troops driving in on Moscow along three salients have reached points within 65 miles of the Soviet capital and outer defenses of the city already are being subjected to bombardment by long-range artillery, Berlin news sources reported Wednesday.

Red sources declared, meanwhile, that the pace of the three-way offensive against Moscow is gradually slowing down.

Point of farthest known penetration of Hitler's armies is in the west but another spearhead driving down from northwest of the city has reached the vicinity of Kalinin, only 95 miles away, it was reported. Kalinin lies on the main Moscow-Leningrad railroad and is strategically important for other reasons.

The Russians have admitted loss to the Germans of Mariopol, on the sea of Azov and 100 miles from Rostov, important Don river city.

In the western hemisphere signing of a reciprocal trade agreement between the United States and Argentina Tuesday night was hailed by President Roosevelt as "a monument to the way of peace, standing in sharp and proud relief on a desolate plain of war and destruction."

The agreement, 12th to be concluded with American republics, permits greater freedom of entry to the United States of Argentine goods, hides, canned meats, flaxseed and cascan and in return, cuts Argentine tariffs on fresh and dried fruits, and automobiles, and assures most-favored-nation treatment to United States exports of manufactured household equipment such as refrigerators and washing machines.

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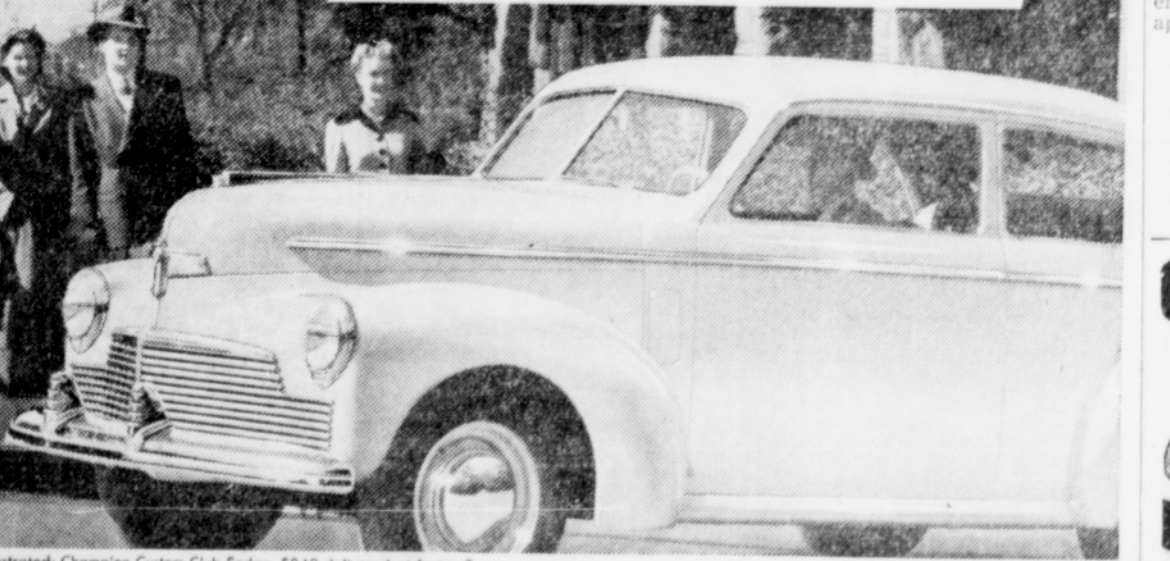
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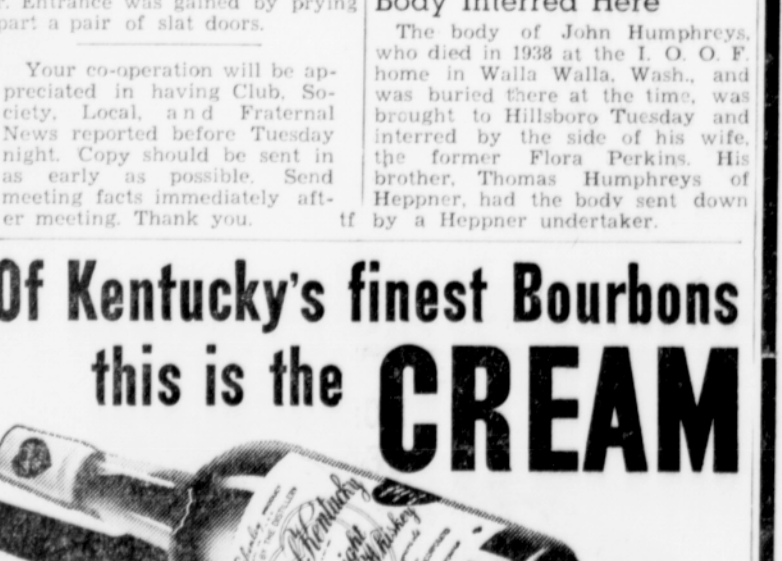


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
