Three Damage Actions Filed

Three circuit court suit sasking a total of \$20,350.50 in damages were filed in the county clerk's office here this week.

Fred Bovee is seeking \$10,000 general damages and \$54.50 special damages for injuries allegedly sustained in an automobile accident on the Banks-Vernonia highway July 20. George Nelson Hopkins and his son, Robert W. Hopkins, are named as defendants.

Julius Christensen, Hillsboro route 5 farmer, is suing the Southern Pacific railroad for \$296 damages allegedly sustained when his truck, which was being operated by a hired driver, was struck by an S. P. locomotive and wrecked at the First avenue crossing in Hillsboro.

Dorothy M. Seybold, administratrix of the estate of Calvin G. Sinn, asks \$10,000 in a suit brought against Mary V. Jossy, doing business as Reamer's Rest, Decatur, a minor, drowned in the Tualatin river at Reamer's Rest on July 6, the complaint charges.

Automobile Dealers Plan Organization
Automobile dealers from Forest Grove, Tigard, Hillsboro and Vernonia took a first step toward organization of a Washington County Automobile Dealers' association Tuesday night at a meeting in the Pharmacy. Approximately 20 dealers attended the session.

Discussion of current problems in the automobile business was led by three men from Portland. George Wallace, president of the Oregon Automotive dealers association; James Cassell, secretary of that organization; and A. B. Smith, secretary of the National Automobile Dealers association. H. L. MacKenzie of Hillsboro acted as chairman of the local meeting.

William Teiser of Hillsboro was appointed temporary chairman to call a meeting on November 5 for furtherance of plans for organization of Washington county car dealers.

Return Nitrogen
Because annual legume seed cover crops return nitrogen to the soil, agencies in the south are encouraging their use, but experiment stations are working at the same time to discover some substitute to eliminate purchase of these seeds.

Federal sponsorship of the seed production program coupled with the readiness of alert trade to put money into it has resulted in phenomenal expansion of this industry and the growth is due to continue, Cyrus said. Meanwhile, prices on seed have advanced materially because poor crops this year did not supply the demand in the south.

Looking to the future, Cyrus said it was his opinion that now is not a good time to plan farm expansion unless the farmer has cash with which to do it. The labor supply problem at the present time is a serious one, especially in the dairy industry. Many dairymen, he said, are faced with curtailment of herds to family-size because they cannot hire competent helpers.

County Seed Value \$1,151,000 in 1942

return from seed production acreage in this county in 1940 was \$299,000 more than would have been realized if the same ground seed production. To contrast the income earned from acreage in wheat as compared with the same oats are the crops going out as more and more land is tagged for had been raising wheat with the market price at \$1 per bushel, Cyrus declared.

Taking into consideration the seed screenings, the total county return realized in 1940 from mixed income from seed crops in that year was about \$750,000.

At the present time, annual legume seeds constitute the larger part of seed production in this county, which, incidentally, is one of only eight counties in the state with seed as one of their major crops. When one considers that only a little over 197,000 acres in the state were devoted to seed production last year, it can be seen that Washington county is more than producing its quota of the state production total, Cyrus said.

Estimated acreages for seed crops and approximate values of yields for the various kinds of legume seeds in 1942 were given by Cyrus in the following table:

The southern cotton farmers who buy Oregon-produced seed for cover crops are in the very lowest income bracket. Oregonians cannot know what "low incomes" are until they investigate the plight of southern farmers, Cyrus declared. The federal government, seeing the need for help in the south, has stepped in to foster the seed production program in the north and devise a workable purchase system for farmers in the south.
