ALOHA—At the regular meeting of the Aloha Grange Thursday night the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the population of Washington county in areas outside of the municipalities is rapidly increasing;

And Whereas, such increase in population causes new problems to arise, many of which relate to personal and community health, among which is that of garbage and refuse disposal;

And Whereas, there exists in said areas serious and acute problems and an inadequate garbage disposal system to properly protect health standards;

Now therefore be it resolved by Aloha Grange P. O. No. 773 in regular meeting this 16th day of October, 1941, that we hereby petition the County Court of Washington County, Oregon, to study this vital problem and provide adequate garbage and refuse disposal facilities for residents in the thickly populated districts in the county outside of incorporated cities.
