SAVORY SPAGHETTI

Half-pound spaghetti, 1-lb. lean fresh pork, diced; 2 small onions, 1 cup tomato soup, 1 1/4 cups water, 2 cups grated cheese, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning. Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water, drain. Fry pork and onions until light brown; add tomato soup, water, cheese and seasoning. Mix with spaghetti and pour in baking dish, top with bread crumbs and cheese. Bake 30 minutes.—Mrs. Anna C. Miller, North Plains.
