years old. It is now October, 1941. We'll go back to October 16, 1841, month and year of the arrival of Isaiah Kelsey and his wife in the Tualatin valley. They were members of the Bidwell party that left Independence, Mo., on May 13, 1841. They met and were married on the western plains June 1 of that year.

The bride was Winifred Williams, daughter of Richard Williams.

Of incidental interest in connection with the Bidwell party's crossing of the plains and on into the Oregon country is the fact that Bidwell, becoming lost, went south with a number of followers and all were lost. The remainder followed Joseph Meek, who brought them through on the Oregon emigrant trail.

On arrival in the Tualatin valley, Kelsey took up a donation land claim on ground where Hillsboro is now situated. He later donated the land on which the Washington county court house now stands.

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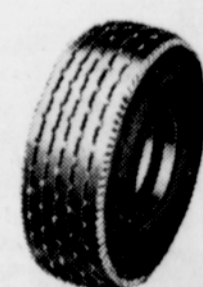
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
