CEDAR MILL—George Keini, 88, an old time resident of this community, died Saturday.

Mr. Keini was born in Wisconsin September 6, 1853, and came to Oregon 63 years ago. He worked for a short time near Salem before purchasing the property on Cornell road, which he had owned for 69 years. His parents were Swiss pioneers, first in Wisconsin, then in Oregon.

Mr. Keini, who was never married, lived with his brother John until his death in 1916. Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wutrich have lived in a part of the large house for many years.

Six years ago a niece, Miss Anne Hirscher, came from Wisconsin to visit her uncle and at his instance remained with him.

Mr. Keini was quite an active man for his advanced years. He delighted in long walks and climbed to the top of Mt. Hood at the age of 73, and often walked to Portland from Cedar Mill in his advanced years. He leaves two nieces, Miss Anne Hirscher of Cedar Mill, Miss Rose Hirscher of Juneau, Wis., Miss Suzanna Merrill, a grand niece who also lives in Wisconsin, Mrs. W. O. Galbraith of Hillsboro, John and Bert Friday of Banks are cousins.

brilliant with searchlights as bombers appear overhead.

It has been suggested by officials that residents of Hillsboro and the vicinity can enjoy an interesting spectacle by driving to surrounding hills for the blackout. The actual "lights out" demonstration is not expected to last more than fifteen minutes, although flights of war planes of various kinds in skies west of the Cascades will have become a common sight before the four-day test is completed.

As a further request, residents have been asked to hold telephone calls to a minimum during the blackout to keep lines open for emergency calls. First aid squads and ambulances are to be in readiness for emergency.

Three long signals of whistles and bells will inform citizens Washington county's blackout period is over.

"This is a means of testing the efficiency of our organization," Defense Chairman Richardson said.

and buy their futures than right now," said Secretary Knox. In outlining the many advantages offered by enlistment in the United States navy, Mr. McKinney said, "it is possible for a bright young man to increase his pay seven times during his first enlistment and be paid even as much as \$126 a month. This monthly figure is actually worth much more when it is remembered that the man has few living expenses and is provided with the finest of medical and dental care."

Many Apply
"When you consider the size of this country and the fact that the navy will select only 15,000 applicants a month from many times that number throughout the United States," the quotation, "Many are called but few are chosen," will apply to local young men interested."

"Navy men are a 'hand-picked' lot. Candidates must be men of more than average intelligence and ambition, of fine moral character and must have the written recommendation of at least two local townpeople."

As many editor, Mr. McKinney has just received from Washington a supply of free illustrated booklets for all men interested and, in addition, will welcome inquiries from young men who wish to look into the new and greater opportunities the navy now offers for training for future civilian careers as they serve their country now in its emergency.

A local Navy club or committee, composed of former navy men, representatives of veterans groups and other local organizations will be named within the next few days to assist in this patriotic program. R. L. (Skipper) Barrett, a former officer in the United States navy, has agreed to serve in an advisory capacity on the committee.
