BANKS—Jack Benefiel, who has charge of the police for the "blackout" Friday night, has appointed two men for each cross road in this district which includes Banks, Roy, Greenville, Manning and Buxton.

B. B. Treham has been appointed head of the aircraft observation committee, which will be on duty from 12 noon Friday until 12 noon Saturday. This committee was also on duty Tuesday Wednesday and Thursday from 10 a. m. until 5 p. m.

The signal for the "blackout" will be three short taps three times in succession of the Banks fire bell. When this signal is given all lights must be put out and cars on highways must pull to one side of the road and turn off all lights. No one should use a telephone except for emergency during the "blackout." The all clear signal will be three long taps of the fire bell.

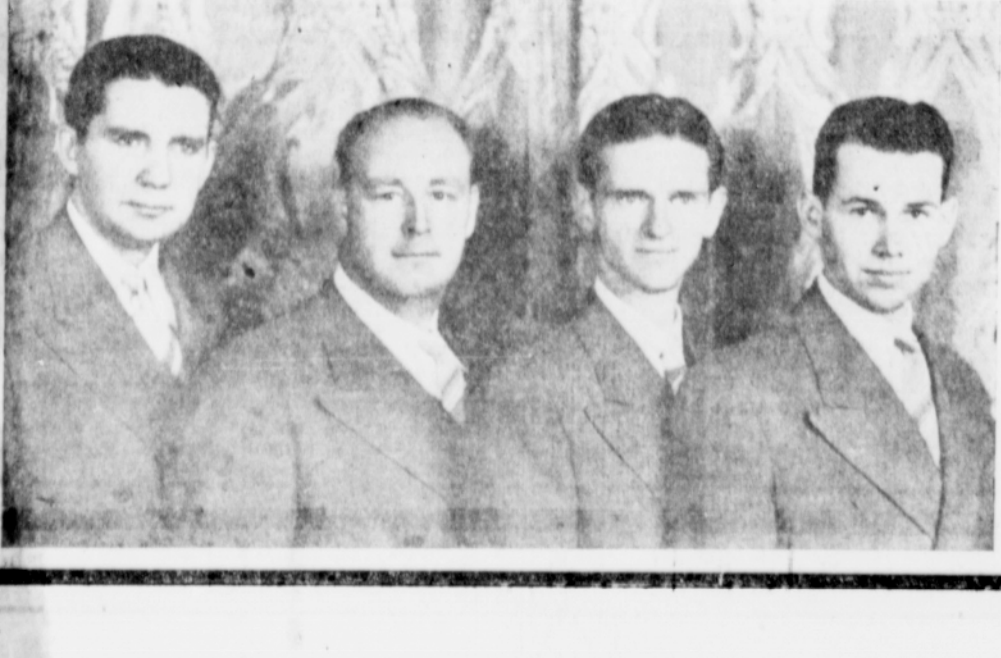
