

Red Cross Roll Call Quota Doubled Here

America's national defense efforts require a great expansion of all American Red Cross activities, W. F. Norman, chairman of the County Red Cross chapter, declared this week in urging "all-out" support of the great membership roll call in Red Cross history to be held from November 11 to 30.

Mr. Norman said the county chapter had been given a quota of 3078 members for its share in the national appeal, instead of 3000 as reported last week. This is a 15 per cent increase per population of more than 3000, and is double the amount raised in the roll call last year, which was \$2671.

"We must go over the top in this roll call," he added, "because the continuance of the national Red Cross program depends upon the success of the local chapters in appealing for members."

Funds realized during the Roll Call period, he pointed out, will be used to enable the American Red Cross and its chapters to carry on its expanded services to the army and navy and to widen its national defense program for the civilian population.

At the annual "kick-off" dinner Wednesday night in the chamber of commerce, Mrs. Margaret Berner, the new general field representative for Oregon, and a member of Governor Sprague's defense committee, spoke on "Roll Call Plans and the Part of the Red Cross in National Defense Program." Mrs. Berner spent Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in this county interviewing Red Cross workers. About 50 Red Cross workers were in attendance at the dinner.
