

Building Program Is Described by Visitor

An eight-year-old program of developing building and construction abilities of 4-H club members and other interested boys and girls was described to Hillsboro Rotary club members at Thursday's meeting by O. G. Hughson, fieldman, state building congress.

The 77-year-old Portlander first started working with a few interested students in Marion and Washington counties in 1933. First exhibit of several models of farm houses and barns built by the group were shown at the state fair in Salem in 1934.

Full Time
Hughson developed his little brain-child into a full-time job with a Portland office. He now travels around the state frequently to organize various county units and is at present starting a Lane county group called the "Building Boy Builders."

Right now he is working hard to have a course on "building construction" taught regularly in all high schools of the state. Fifteen or 20 are already teaching electrical work, painting, carpentry, etc., and Hughson believes the day is not far distant when it will be generally taught in the country.

Busy Man
Meanwhile, he is busy traveling around and starting building clubs in counties where sufficient interest is shown. Several boys who first showed interest in Hughson's building hints back in the middle thirties are now busy in airplane plants, he told the Rotary club.

Another guest speaker on the double-barreled Rotary program was Quartermaster Charles Horn, of the navy recruiting office in

Portland. He spoke briefly of the United States navy's present drive to "ship" 100,000 new men in line with the two-earner navy building program. Horn showed a movie of the fleet in action.

President W. C. Christensen introduced Horn, and Hughson was presented to the meeting by V. W. Gardner, local contact man for the state building congress visitor.

County Club Women Hold Meet at Scholls

SCHOLLS—With members of the Junior club assisting, the Scholls Women's club was hostess to around sixty guests from neighboring clubs at the church on Friday, October 24. Interest in the rights of others, seemed to be the underlying theme of the meeting, and serious attention was given the speakers of the day.

Miss Dulcinea Brown, who spoke on international relations, stated that belief in the best, and in peace to come, must govern our lives today, of normal living will be lost. Self education, both in the international field and in our own lives was stressed as needful, particularly in later years, when small good influence will spread as do the waves in a pool when a stone is dropped into it. The love of brotherhood must underlie each step we take, as a nation and as individuals, and should lead our nation into equal recognition of everyone inside our own borders, regardless of class or nationality.
