Governor Thanks Defense Workers For Co-operation

Cooperation of Washington county and its civilian defense workers in last Friday night's blackout experiment was lauded in a letter of appreciation received this week by C. T. Richardson, chairman of the county defense council, from Governor Charles A. Sprague, state director of civilian defense.

The letter, in part, read:
Thanks Workers
The splendid cooperation received from Washington county in connection with the army air maneuvers and the blackout test, is appreciated deeply. Please extend my thanks to the civilian defense workers who gave so freely of their time and energy to make the program a success.

It was a source of keen disappointment that army bombers were unable to leave the ground at McChord field, Tacoma, the night of the blackout as it would have added greatly to the interest in the experiment but it was not worth the very probable sacrifice of life which might have resulted from a flight under such unfavorable weather conditions.

of our army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, and
Whereas, our national civilian defense program necessitates a strengthening of all those services essential to the public health and welfare, and

Whereas, no section of the United States is free from the threat of natural catastrophe or disaster, such as flood, hurricane, tornado, epidemic, earthquake, fire, explosion, epidemic, and every other calamity, and

Whereas, the international situation still continues to cause intense distress among innocent victims, making essential American aid to suffering humanity abroad; and

Whereas the American Red Cross is the only organization in our land equipped and ready, first, to assist, advise, and otherwise serve the men of our armed forces and their loved ones at home; second, to carry on in our own and every other community such indispensable welfare programs as Red Cross public health nursing, instruction in home nursing, first aid, water safety, and all kinds of accident prevention, and through the Junior Red Cross in the schools, to act as the medium for service by our young people; third, to render protection and relief in case of the aforementioned disasters, and fourth to undertake the administration of American aid to stricken non-combatants and refugees abroad;

Therefore, I, Hugh S. Rogers, mayor of Hillsboro, proclaim the period of this 1941 American Red Cross Annual Roll Call, from November 11 to November 30, a time during which the public spirited people of this community, both men and women, boys and girls, should make every effort to support and strengthen the Red Cross by enrolling through our local chapter as members of the Red Cross, or by renewing their membership in it; and I further proclaim that it is the sense of all of us who are residents of Hillsboro and vicinity that our membership enrollment in the Red Cross must be larger than ever this year, in order to enable this great national organization of ours to meet whatever demands may be made upon it.
