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Schendels Return From Month's Trip Of 11,500 Miles

They made the trip to Chicago by train, including a boat trip to Vancouver, B. C., and then through the Canadian Rockies. They visited Niagara Falls on the U. S. and Canadian sides; visited Montreal and Quebec City, Canada, where they enjoyed the old French city of Quebec with its old world architecture and costumes. All men went about the streets bareheaded.

They report that they visited nearly all the mountains of the nation, including the Green and White mountains in Maine, Adirondacks in New York, Blue Ridge mountains of Virginia, Cumberland, Ozarks in Missouri, where they visited the site of "The Shepherd of the Hills," the novel written by Harold Bell Wright. They also visited the Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, the largest known cavern in the world; and then to Tennessee.

Returning through Oklahoma they encountered the novel weather caused driving through mud up to the running boards in Alva and Enid. They had planned to visit at Wichita, Kansas, but due to the floods in that state, could not go there.

From Denver, Colorado, they crossed the Berthoud pass, the highest point in the Rockies, where they drove through eight inches of snow at an elevation of 11,314 feet. Appreciates Home Paper

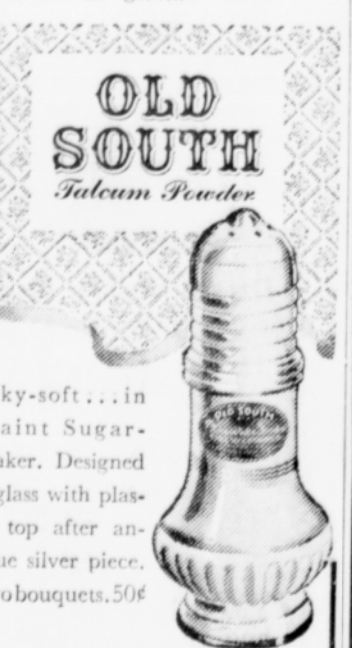
