He was employed on the new \$2,500,000 Quaker Line Motorship Idaho, a C-2 type vessel, built at Tacoma, while in Portland and Warrenton he loaded lumber for the Panama Canal, New York and South Africa. On trial runs this ship exceeded 17½ knots. He returned by the overland route visiting Cleveland, Chicago, Omaha, Cheyenne and Salt Lake City.

While in Salt Lake City he visited the great Mormon tabernacle and listened to its world famous pipe organ. Acoustic properties in this tabernacle are so fine that the ticking of an ordinary clock may be distinctly audible in all parts. Within this building is to be found one of the largest organs known to man. It measures 30 feet by 33 feet and is 48 feet high.
