The following letter received by Mrs. Warren tells how much the Red Cross contributions are appreciated:

"Chairman, Washington County Chapter, American Red Cross, Hillsboro, Oregon

"May we thank you for the very lovely afghans and pillow which we received from your chapter recently. It is always pleasant to anticipate the needs of the Military as well as your gifts permitted us to. On the day the afghans arrived, we had issued the last of the very few we had on hand. The following day, two badly injured patients were brought into the hospital where their severely injured limbs were treated. They were placed in our surgical ward, and because of the nature of their injuries, an immediate request was made for afghans for covering. These warm, yet light weight and in such cases where the weight and bulk of a blanket is impossible.

"Therefore, we express both ours and the Military's gratitude for your practical and colorful gifts. We and they know and appreciate the amount of time and effort that has gone into the making of these articles. We hope the fact that they are so eagerly welcomed and used will serve as some small recompense, together with our very real thanks. Sincerely,
