

Strikes Theaten Coal Production And Railroads

A racing coal dispute in the east, which threatens to halt soft coal production and tie up the nation's railroads, caused President Roosevelt to call a conference of labor and industrial leaders Wednesday.

A C. I. O. boycott of the national defense mediation board dealt a severe blow to that peace-making agency and caused the President to call three C. I. O. leaders and three major steel company executives to confer Friday.

Meanwhile, 15,000 workers who handle long-distance wires in 42 states of the nation, were reported by John L. Noran, president of the Federation of Long Lines Telephone Workers, an independent union, to be ready for a huge walkout.

In the German-Russian war, the Nazi forces appeared to have soft en through on their Crimean drive to the shores of the Kerch strait to within sight of the Caucasus.

Along the central front their cold and weary armies were apparently getting no better than a draw and being bettered.

The Russians did acknowledge that the German thrust on the south had carried to the vicinity of Narominsk, 35 miles away.

Prime Minister Churchill of England stirred the Pacific crisis further by warning Japan that she would find herself at war with Britain if she went to war with the United States.

The house of representatives Thursday by a vote of 212 to 194 approved the administration bill authorizing American ships to sail anywhere in the world under the protection of their own flag and guns.

Hilhi Schedules Night Classes

For the second successive year, Hillsboro high school will stage mechanical night classes for the out-of-school group of young men in the community between the ages of 17 and 24 for the purpose of providing emergency defense training.

According to James B. Thomas, vocational agriculture instructor at the high school who is co-ordinator for the program here, sessions will be held in metal work, operation and care of tractors, trucks, and automobiles, and possibly woodwork and elementary electricity.

Classes will run for eight weeks, starting December 1, for five nights a week from 7 to 10 p. m., he said. Blanks for those interested in signing for the courses may be seen at the Hillsboro Argus office or from Mr. Thomas at the high school.

Hillsboro High Stages Annual Armistice Event

Students and teachers of Hillsboro high school paused from work Monday afternoon for their annual Armistice Day program and observance of World War No. 1's completion which came 23 years ago.

Main speaker of the day was W. Verne McKinney, editor and co-publisher of the Hillsboro Argus, who depicted aggression of "pow-er-mad dictators" who are threatening our American way of life with its rights and privileges.

"Let observance of this Armistice bring action which will make another 'Armistice to Come' a real and lasting peace to a world where the spirit of the Golden Rule will play a more important part," he said.

Recalls '18

Editor McKinney recalled days of 1917 and 1918 when Hillsboro high school sent boys overseas, and spoke of his own experiences in France. He concluded that the rallying cry of unity today should be the slogan, "America, Love it or Leave it."

Also introduced to the group was Commander A. J. Foelker of the Hillsboro American Legion post, who expressed appreciation to the students for their outstanding contribution to the community's Armistice observance.

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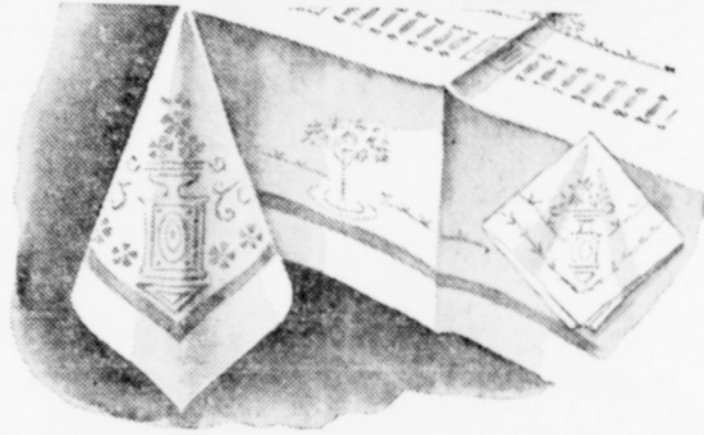

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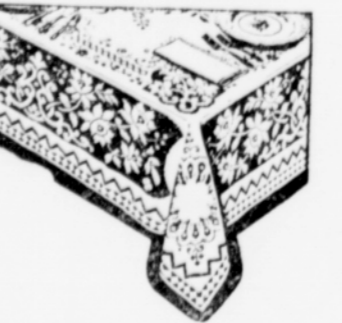
