City Assured Traffic Signals To Come Soon

CITY MANAGER J. W. BARNEY of Hillsboro announced this week that assurances have been received from the state highway commission that erection of traffic lights at the intersection of First, Second and Third avenues will be forthcoming in the near future.

The state highway commission officially authorized the project in line with its program to make the Tualatin highway more safe. According to terms, the City of Hillsboro is to pay half on the expense of erection of the signal lights.

Barney said: "We presume that something will be done there in the near future."

Meanwhile, Hillsboro's attempt to have signal lights installed at the intersection of First avenue and Cedar street on the Hillsboro-Woodburn secondary highway seems to be again stalled after two years of attempt by city officials to push the project through.

Receives Letter
City Manager Barney this week received a letter from C. B. McCullough, assistant chief engineer of the Oregon state highway commission stating only that the signal "is on the list for installation as soon as the necessary data has been submitted by the railroad company. It will then be referred to the public roads administration for approval."

This particular crossing was placed on the public roads administration's program in 1939 for improving safety of railroad crossings, to be one of the state's first under the P. R. A. Since that time the city has been unable to get action on the project, according to Barney.

The crossing has been regarded as particularly dangerous, according to city officials, because of heavy traffic on the Tualatin highway and due to the number of low flat hard-to-see logging cars which travel along the railroad.

Whipped with Wet Ropes

Ken Taylor, writing from Dallas, Texas, sends this story, told by a Russian visiting them there. It seems this visitor from Europe had been selling Bibles in Roumania and had given a copy to a villager who read it and was converted. The man in turn read it to his family and friends and as a result many of them became believers. Finally, out of the reading, 250 of the villagers turned to the Lord.

Bible Hurts Business
The bartender of the place and the local magistrate felt such a loss in revenue that they sought to get hold of the Book. By this they would put an end to the Christian movement that was so losing them trade. The villagers in the meantime had set themselves to commit the Bible to memory and 13 of them had all the New Testament, but one Gospel, by heart, as well as Genesis and Exodus. Many others had equivalent amounts in various parts of the world.

All this came to light when the traveler, who had given out the Bible, returned to check up. Learning of his presence, the magistrate caused his arrest and sentenced him to be beaten with wet ropes. He was whipped until almost dead and though he recovered, his back is a mass of rough welts, lying evenly as the pulped flesh healed together.

Feed Your Faith
Faith comes from the message heard and the message from Christ through the pages of the Bible. Much faith; little Bible, little faith. That is the rule. Out of the reading of the Book these Roumanians came to believe that God had a Son who died for their sins. God

gave them eternal life as he does to all who receive forgiveness of sins on the ground that Christ paid the debt by His death. Away Below Consciousness
