Letter Tells of Raid on Hawaii
ALOHA-HUBER—A friend of the C. E. Barker family, living in Honolulu, writes as follows:

"I hope by now that you have heard that we are all right. I was about to say, safe, but will never feel safe here again so long as we are at war with Japan. At least we were not killed nor injured, but it is certainly shattering to one's mental being and sense of security."

"Thinking you may like to hear first hand of the onslaught, Sunday a. m. we were up as usual at 6 a. m. All quiet and peaceful. Larry had work to do at his office and had breakfast at 7 a. m., and left the house at 7:30 a. m. About three minutes before eight, I heard the terrible firing and the screech and explosion of bombs. I ran out on the lanai and like a panorama the dreadful scene at Pearl Harbor, in a bright and sunny morning, was spread before my view. Great billows of black smoke, many planes flying low over Pearl Harbor, bursts of fire and heavy detonation of anti-aircraft guns and chacs at its worst. None of my neighbors were up, many sleep late here on Sunday mornings, but I ran to the Ashes and heavy detonation of anti-aircraft guns and chacs at its worst. They had been awakened by the heavy firing just a few minutes before, but could not realize what was happening. They all came out on our lanai and there we all sat for over two hours and watched the devastation. A terrific explosion which seemed to be in our own yard occurred at one time, but later proved to be a stray airplane evidently fleeing from the guns at Pearl Harbor. It had opened fire at random and hit a home occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Perry. Just a few feet from the road below us, passed through their bedroom windows and missed their bed by a margin, dug great holes in the floor of their living room, finally through their floor and into the earth. Their house is a wreck from the concussion. Several fires were started in Honolulu proper, and one school house was partly destroyed. Am sending you the first paper published which gives the happenings and when. Also a later one which gives the killed and wounded in Honolulu proper. It's possible they are coming all mail, private or otherwise, going out of here, but I will make this anyway, hoping it may reach you. We tried to send you a letter late Sunday afternoon, but were told no civilians were allowed to send them.

"Another attack was staged Monday morning, but was apparently driven off before much more damage was done. The city has already been restricted to civilian use and no gasoline unless one can prove it's absolutely necessary. An absolute blackout all over the city from sundown to dawn each night. Larry finally managed to get home from his office Sunday morning about 9, which is down on the water front in Honolulu."

Relief Drive Held
Launched on December 18, and continuing until December 23, the high school Christmas relief drive enabled the town over a large collection of food, clothing, toys, and home necessities to the town relief program. A service banner was presented to the class having the largest number of contributors. A substantial money contribution was this year to be given to the U. S. O.

Need Found Less
