Raw Apple Cake

Half cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1½ cups ground raw apples, 1 cup raisins, 2 cups flour. Dissolve 2 teaspoons soda in 2 tablespoons hot water, 1 cup nut meat, 1 teaspoon each of cinnamon, nutmeg and vanilla; cream butter and sugar. Add apples, raisins and nuts, mix well. Add flour with spices and soda. Bake in loaf pan. This cake improves when a few days old—Mrs. C. Kaufman, Rt. 1, Hillsboro.

Cream Sponge Cake

Sift together: 1 cup sugar, 1½ cups flour, ¼ teaspoon salt, one slightly rounded teaspoon baking powder. Break into a cup same size two eggs, and fill with good cream, not too thick and heavy. Pour into bowl and beat well; add sifted ingredients; add flavor. Whipped cream, flavored, makes good filling—Minnie M. Swartz, Rt. 4, Hillsboro.

Skillet Corn Bread

Bake in an iron skillet. 1½ cups sifted flour, 2½ teaspoons baking powder, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, ¾ cups corn meal, ½ cup of Spry melted, 1 egg well beaten, 1 cup milk.

Sift flour with baking powder, sugar, salt, and corn meal and mix.

Melt Spry in skillet. Combine beaten egg, milk and melted Spry; add flour mixture, blend. Pour into hot skillet and bake in hot oven (400 F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Serves eight—Vera Olson, Rt. 8, Box 1625, Portland.
