Scarcity of Labor Hampers Farm Work

ing to the data collected by the AAA supervisors on the food for production program survey made during November. This increase in production will come both from an increased number of cows and, according to the data, an increase in the production per cow.

Production Examined
Other products which are slated for an increase, if this data is dependable, are hogs, eggs, and annual legume seeds. Data collected represents production on 240 farms. The figures were collected by triple A committeemen and supervisors on a farm to farm survey. These increases are prompted by the prospect of higher prices and the need for greater food supplies for the coming year.

Austrian peas and the various vetches were grown for seed on 24,665 acres in 1941. Data collected indicates 25,723 acres of these crops were planted in 1942. Higher prices announced in September for peas, vetch, crimson clover, and rye grass seed, has resulted in this slight increase but the higher prices are not reflected in the increase as they are in just maintaining the acreage we have been growing.

Yields Low
The prices on these seeds for the 1942 crop no higher than they were in 1941, there would certainly have been a pronounced shrinkage in the acreages of annual legumes for seed in Washington county. The yields have not been high enough to maintain the acreage we have had the past two years. While the increased prices have meant some increase in planting, the most pronounced effect has been in keeping the acreage from shrinking. The actual acreage probably is slightly higher than the survey figure.

Local growers are looking at the 1942 crop with some concern. They realize that there are definite limits to the acreage of peas and the vetches that can be successfully grown in Washington county. They are determined by good cropping practice and the necessity of maintaining cropping systems that will keep disease and insect pests at a low point.

Dairying Limited
The present all considerations of these programs by local farmers runs appreciation of the fact that dairying is particularly suited to this area and that a large part of the agricultural income of the county has always been obtained from dairy cows and that they offer a steady and dependable source of income through years of high prices and through years of low prices. Even though the price may be disappointing low, the dairy cow is and has been the backbone of Washington county agriculture.

Perhaps the only important consideration during the past year and in the coming year tending to decrease dairy production is the labor supply question.

Washington county citizens were generally much concerned in the early summer about the probable scarcity of berry pickers. Fortunately, cool and damp weather throughout the ripening season slowed down the maturing and ripening of the fruit so that the picking season was prolonged and the help available was adequate to take care of the crop.

Excessively rainy weather in September ruined more than 50 per cent of the prune crop. Larger numbers of pickers would possibly have lessened the loss but would not have eliminated it.

Winter's First Snow Hits Here on Sunday
Winter's first flurries of snow of any amount here left Hillsboro and surrounding country coated with a thin sheet of white Sunday morning. The snow was light and dry and was practically all melted away before nightfall.

Last previous snow here was January 3, 1941, according to A. W. Moore, local weather observer, although it melted as soon as it hit. Last measurable snow was on January 24 and 25, 1940, when a heavy snowfall was recorded. Sunday's fall was less than an inch deep in most places.
