Battle of Philippines in 1898 Related by Mayor Hugh Rogers

Mayor Hugh S. Rogers of Hillsboro was a member of an honor guard of ten men from the 2nd Oregon infantry which protected sailors who hauled down the Spanish flag at Manila on August 13, 1898, and hoisted the Stars and Stripes.

Rogers volunteered for service in the age of 28 and sailed for the Philippines with company A of the 2nd Oregon, which was composed of national guardsmen from Portland and McMinnville. They served under Captain H. L. Heaton, former publisher of the McMinnville Telephone-Register.

All told, he served for more than one year in the Philippine islands, and was discharged at San Francisco on August 7, 1899, as a corporal with a record of 27 engagements including the Philippine insurrection.

First to Land
"We landed in country where they were having their hardest fight," Mayor Rogers recalled the other day. "We were the first troops to land in support of Admiral Dewey and the United States fleet."

Recalling the flag raising at Manila, Rogers said: "We had been delegated to take down the Spanish flag and raise our own but Admiral Dewey thought the navy should do it so he detailed his flag lieutenant and two sailors for the duty. We then raised the American flag."

The Spanish flag was given to the 2nd Oregon volunteer infantry, he said, and the 2nd unit's veterans association totes it out for their annual picnic held at Laurelhurst park in Portland on the nearest Sunday to the 13th of August. Rogers has been vice-president of the association for 12 years.

America's Salute
Mayor Rogers told of an amusing incident in connection with the taking of Guam by American forces previous to the battle for Manila. When we got to the island of Guam our navy convoy had orders to seize the Spanish fort and take the island which was under Spanish control. Our ship, the cruiser Charleston, bombarded the fort and finally put it into boats to go ashore.

"We met an aid of the Spanish governor who had been sent out to apologize that he had run out of powder and was unable to return our salute. Not a shot had been fired from the fort and the governor did not know we were at war."

We thought it was funny, I think the Charleston fired 12 shells into the fort and practically dismantled it—yet the governor thought it was just a salute!"

After taking about 200 Spanish prisoners from Guam, they then

headed for Manila, landing and making headquarters at Cavite where the Filipinos had bested Spaniards in a battle and driven them out.

We got orders on the 12th of August that we were to attack Manila on the morning of the 13th after Dewey had demanded its surrender. We went over on barges, sailing under the guns of Admiral Dewey's fleet."

Mayor Rogers said capture of Manila at that time was at very little loss of American manpower although eastern troops had waged several brisk battles with the Spaniards previous to that.

Company A lost only one man in the engagement and 12 were wounded out of 105. Seven men died of illness during the year of service on the Philippines. Seventy-eight men of the joint Portland and McMinnville troop enlisted for service in April of 1898.

Our outfit stayed until after the outbreak of the Philippine insurrection on February 5th. In fact, they were still fighting when we left for home in July, 1899. It took a month to come across and we were held in San Francisco several weeks.

Mayor Rogers was doing printing when he volunteered for service—a type of work he liked—and during the year's service on the Philippines did a lot of work on the Manila Times.

With P. R. & N.
He first came to Hillsboro in 1905 to work with the engineering department of the Pacific Railway & Navigation company as a surveyor and established residence here in 1912.

Speaking of the present fight of the Philippines, Rogers said: "I didn't think they would be able to hold Manila, unless they got more planes. General MacArthur didn't have enough troops in the face of reinforcements the Japs poured in. I don't think, however, the Japanese fleet will be able to get in past the Corregidor fortress."

And Mayor Rogers stays right with so many other war veterans and present military experts in predicting eventual victory for the United States.
