

Adjustment of School Calendars To Seasonal Work Pondered

The perplexing problem of just when schools should open and close each year in order to co-operate with harvesting and cannery operations of the vicinity is being studied by a state committee composed of John R. Cox, Hillsboro high school principal; Edwin Woodworth, Oregon City; H. W. Adams, Silverton; R. E. Rennie, Newberg; and D. A. Emerson, assistant state superintendent of schools.

At a recent meeting in Salem, Washington county school administrators, representatives of other schools, and the state department of education agreed to the recommendation that school calendars be adjusted so that they would not start before September 28 and close not later than May 14.

State Law Varies
Although there is no existing state law for the minimum number of days high schools must operate it was suggested that no decrease be made in the present year of approximately eight, and one-half months. Grade schools in Oregon must be open a minimum number of 160 days.

County school operations vary in Oregon as to starting and closing dates, but each district within a county governs its own school calendar, according to B. W. Barnes, county school superintendent.

Recommendations Made
The Salem conference recommended that each community in the state, where possible, work out its own plans for early dismissal of school this spring depending upon the need for student help in agricultural work. It was suggested that spring vacations be eliminated if the community feels it necessary.

The group also recommended that any shortening of school terms should not lower academic standards of the schools or change the months of teacher contracts.

Approximately 50 principals and superintendents from Washington, Klamath, Benton, Clackamas, Yamhill, Marion, and Lane counties attended the Salem meeting which was presided over by D. A. Emerson, assistant superintendent of public schools. Attending from the vicinity were: Cox, Paul A. Menegat, principal of Forest Grove high school; I. R. Metzler, superintendent of Beaverton schools; and R. L. Kautz, principal of Verboort high school.

Awards in Scouting Given at Orenco Meet

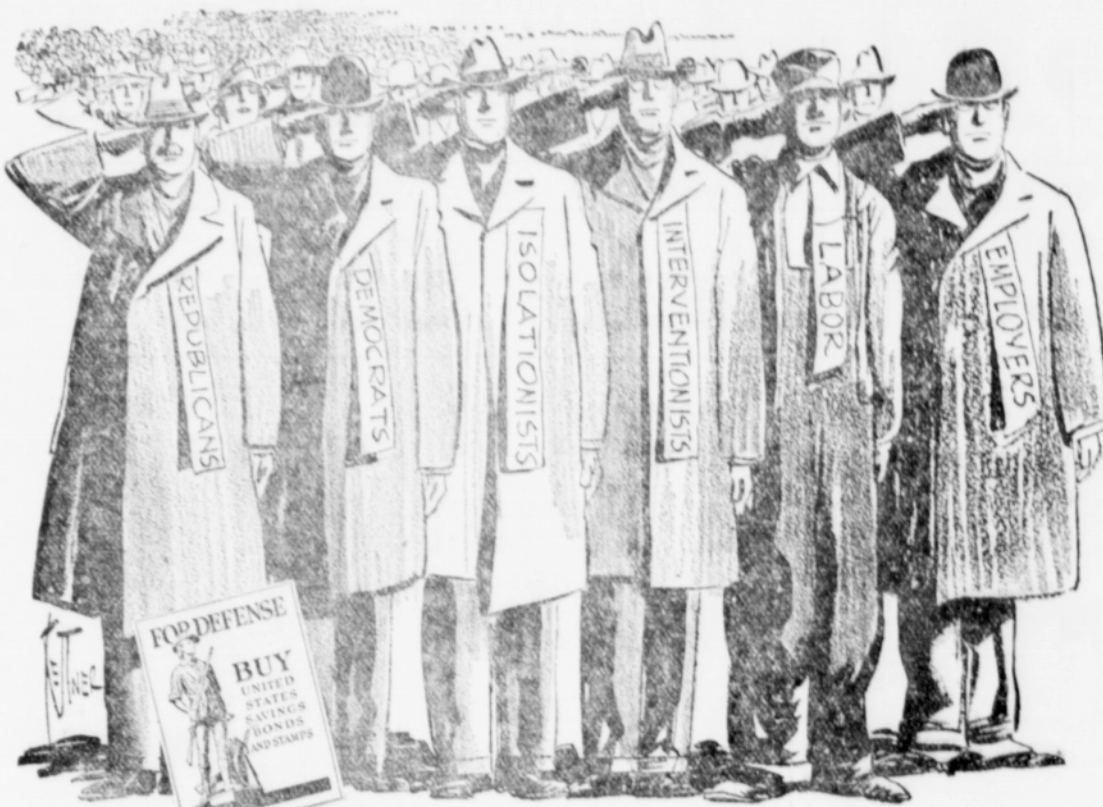
