Second Order Moving Given

Approximately 700 Japanese will register at the civil control station at the Administration building at the Gresham fair grounds at Gresham Thursday and Friday, May 7 and 8, preparatory to evacuation. The new order includes Clackamas county and that portion of Multnomah county, east of the west side of 122nd avenue and the extension thereof, from the northern limits of the county to the southern limits.

Evacuees from this area will be moved to the Portland assembly center, the movement to begin May 11 and will be completed by noon Tuesday, May 12.

If this \$1,250,000 were used for patriotism instead of for PUD politics it would build—

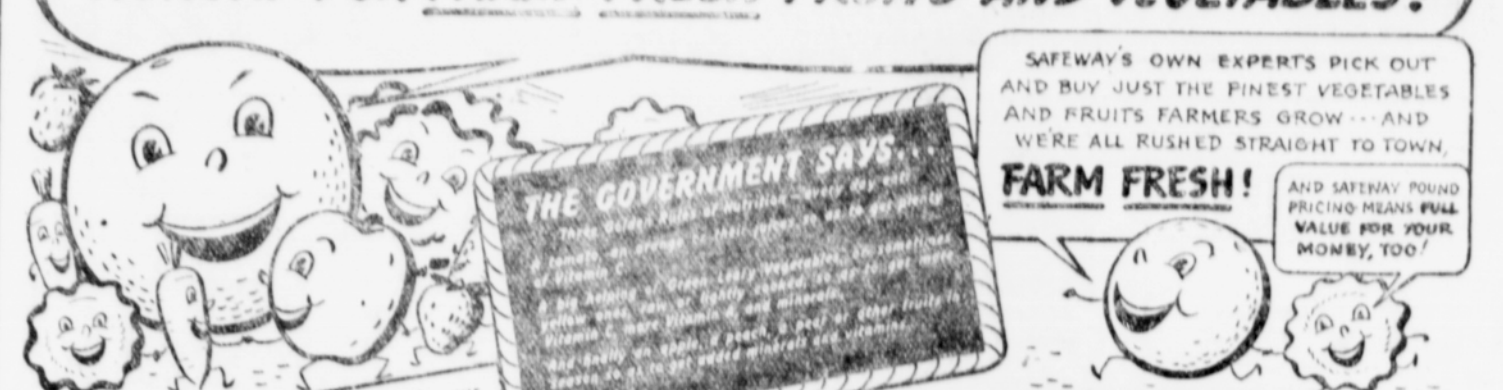
