# Assessment On Land Reduced Through Decree

A long period of litigation brought by Zina Wood, owner of a 300-acre farm just south of Hillsboro, against the Washington County Board of Equalization and the Oregon State Tax commission over assessed valuation of his property was brought to an end Thursday by a decree issued by Circuit Judge R. Frank Peters.

The decree set the assessment figure at \$11,400, in contrast to the valuation of \$13,310 for the farm as shown on the 1942 tax roll. On the basis of the court ruling, Wood's tax total for the four years during which the matter has been under appeal will amount to approximately \$2600, county tax figures disclosed.

The Hillsboro farmer originally appealed the assessment to the county tax equalization board, then the matter was carried to the state tax commission, before being brought for hearing in court here.

The complaint charged that the assessment for 1937 was excessive and disproportionate to similar properties in the county. Wood was allowed costs of \$107.20.

# England Well Invaded

Sir Stafford Cripps assured the British house of commons Wednesday that the R. A. F.'s heavy offensive against the vitals of Germany's war production is a prelude to an ultimate invasion, and the best way that Britain can aid Russia at this time.

# Defending Prime Minister Churchill

ill against his conduct of the war, both as defense minister and prime minister, Cripps said that Germany still holds the initiative, and has superior forces and interior lines of communication. In these circumstances, he said, it is surprising that worse results had not ensued.

# The assurance that Great Britain

is massing strength and intends to "make a carefully planned attack on the continent of Europe," came at the conclusion of a two-day war debate in the house of commons.

# Troops Land in Ireland

The largest convoy of the war brought thousands upon thousands of United States troops, equipped with tanks, heavy guns and other invasion material to northern Ireland. It was revealed Tuesday. Despite sporadic enemy attacks, no ships were lost. The landing was the first visible result of the promise by General George C. Marshall, United States army chief of staff, that a steady flow of men and supplies would be sent across the ocean to insure "an early victory."

# Mussolini Debates

Mussolini is reported to be debating the question whether to go ahead with the old Italian claims to the French territory of Nice, Corsica and Tunisia in the face of a hard war with Russia.

# Prinz Eugen Damaged

The powerful 10,000-ton Nazi cruiser Prinz Eugen was torpedoed Monday night as knocked out of the vital Atlantic battle for three months by damages received in an R. A. F. fighter-bomber attack Sunday.

# Nazi Oppose R. A. F.

The first opposition to R. A. F. fighters in several weeks was put up suddenly by the German air force in occupied France Sunday. At least nine most planes and eight British were reported destroyed. However, despite the resistance, R. A. F. fighter sweeps continued ceaselessly from dawn to dusk.

# French, British Clash

French and British forces engaged in a brief gun battle Monday morning off Algiers in the Mediterranean. The action was militarily unimportant except that it further sharpened Vichy's official temper already aroused by the British seizure of Madagascar in the Indian ocean.

# Jobs Mass Fleet

The Japanese are known to be re-forming their fleet, scattered in the battle of the Coral sea two weeks ago, and massing their forces along a 1700 mile arc of invasion bases north of Australia for a new thrust southward.
